Prohibition Town

Says He Went To Firm on Business for His

The man taken in by Officer Busick at a late hour Wednesday night and who gave his name as Ed Glenn, was none other than Ed Lang, a harmless old fellow whose name has appeared on the police register on many former occasions, says the Salem Statesman. Lang, who has been making his headquarters at Eugene of late, told Recorder Moses an amusing story when he was called before the bar in the police court yesterday morning. He dwelt at length upon the subject of the recent change in Lane county, and expressed himself as highly displeased with the new order of things. He told the judge that it was either Roseburg or Salem when a man wished to appease his appetite and being possessed of many fond recollections of his experiences in Salem police circles he, for one, preferred to visit the Capital City in cases of "emergency." On this occasion he said his mission to Salem was one of business as well as pleasure, that he was instructed by his "firm" to purchase some machinery and he declared that every day of his absence meant a loss of from \$300 to \$400 to his "firm."

After listening to his detailed explanation of the various circumstances connected with his latest visit to this city, Judge Moores informed Lang that he would release him without fine since the fact that Officer Busick found him tangled up in the gears of a harvesting machine at an hour close to midnight seemed to corroborate his story relative to his intended purchase. Lang admitted that he had worked overtime in his effort to carry out the instructions of his "firm," and promised, if given his liberty, to borrow some money and take the first train for the "prohibition town of Eugene."

Lang was set free, but failed to make good his promise and yesterday afternoon was again picked up by Marshal Cornelius and locked up in the city jail.

PROCLAMATION.

Whereas, There was submitted to the electors of the state at the last general election as required by law an initiative petition for a proposed amendment to Section 2 of Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Oregon, giving cities and towns exclusive power to enact and amend their charters, subject to the constitution and criminal laws of the State of Oregon, and

Whereas, on the 25th day of June 1906 the Secretary of State in my presence as Governor of the State of Oregon did canvass the votes given for and against said amendment and determined upon such canvass that there were 52,567 votes cast for said amendment and 19,852 votes against the same, and that said amendment received an affirmative majority of the total number of effective votes cast thereon and entitled to be counted under the provisions of law,

Now, therefore, I, George E. Chamberlain, as Governor of the State of Oregon, in obedience to and by virtue of the power and authority vested in me by law, do hereby make and issue this proclamation to the people of the State of Oregon and do announce and declare that the whole number of votes cast in the State of Oregon at said election for and against said proposed amendment was as hereinbefore stated, and that said proposed amendment received an affirmative majority of the total number of votes cast thereon and entitled to be counted and amendment hereinbefore mentioned shall be and is in full force and effect as a part of the constitution of the State of Oregon from the date of this proclamation.

Done at the capitol this 25th day of June, A. D. 1906.
