MAY HAVE VALUABLE MINERAL LEDGE

Gold, Silver and Iron Ore on Nighswander Property at Hadleyville—Company Will be Incorporated.

N. G. Hayes, who is interested in the recent find of a ledge of gold and Hadleyville, was in Eugene today. He informed a Guard reporter that quite a prospect hole had been dug in the side of the hill and that assays made by Herbert Leigh of some of the ore taken out showed gold and silver to the value of \$1 to the ton. Besides the gold and silver Mr. Hayes says the rock contains considerable iron. Pieces of the rock have been placed in a forge and heated to a white heat and the iron melted and ran out.

Mr. Hayes is associated with Frank Nighswander and Scott Weber in the work of prospecting. They expect to incorporate a company soon and begin work on systematic manner.
