ADDRESSED DAIRYMEN AND FARMERS

Professor McKay, of Iowa Agricultural College, in Eugene.

Meeting Held at Commercial Club Rooms This Afternoon -- State Dairy and Food Commissioner Bailey, Dr. James Withycombe and H. E. Lounsbury Also Spoke.

A goodly number of dairymen and farmers gathered at the Commercial Club rooms this afternoon to listen to addresses by Professor G. L. McKay, of the dairying department of the Iowa Agricultural College, and others upon the dairying industry. Professor McKay and party consisting of the following arrived here on this afternoon's train from the north and were taken to the Hotel Smeed: J. W. Bailey, state dairy and food commissioner; Professor Jas. Withycombe and F. L. Kent, of the Oregon Agricultural College; H. E. Lounsbury, district freight agent, and H. A. Hinchey, traveling freight agent of the Southern Pacific Co. The party was then taken to the Commercial Club, President L. L. Whitson presided at the meeting and introduced in their turn Professor McKay, Mr. Bailey, Professor Withycombe and Mr. Lounsbury.

Mr. McKay said in part: "Oregon has a most excellent market in Portland, hence the cost of shipping is minimum. Your conditions in the state and especially in the Willamette Valley, are ideal for the business, for I have not seen anywhere richer, more productive soil or better climate conditions. They approach the ideal. Wheat pays but from \$22 to \$25 per ton, while butter realizes to the farmer \$700 per ton. Your attention should be given to the herd test or selection of the best butter-yielding cows. There are three essential things. First, feed well; second, procure a uniform breed; third, select to improve the herd. From what I have seen of your state I am satisfied that you can produce as cheaply as any state in the union, and you should see to it that your great city of Portland does not of necessity import butter from other states, as has been done in the past."

Dr. James Withycombe devoted most of his discourse to methods of feeding. The kinds of food for stock that gave best results and how to feed it. He said that the future of agricultural Oregon depended on the dairying industry, because the cow enriches the soil and also brings in a never failing monthly stipend. As an example he cited Washington county under conditions that prevailed when wheat was the leading product and now those of the present time, when butter-making is foremost. In the first instance, there was not a bank in the county, but now there are five good banks. He also told how the soil could be rejuvenated by raising vetch and clover for cowfeed, as had been done at the experiment station at Corvallis, where land has been termed "worn out" and "exhausted" but had been made to produce 50 bushels of grain per acre.

Commissioner Bailey said that the Valley counties should put a carload of butter, hogs, etc., into Portland daily; that the market there was always open and active. Mr. Lounsbury gave an accurate comparison of Oregon counties and other counties in Iowa to show the natural advantages in resources possessed by Oregon, and what the state might accomplish by systematic, skillful dairying.

MAY CONSTRUCTION RAILROAD FROM NATRON FIRST

Contracts May Be Let Before Those for the Drain-Coos Bay Line--- Harriman Anxious to Forestall Attempts of Rivals to Build Over This Route

An army of surveyors is being rushed into the field on the proposed Harriman line from Natron through central Oregon, says yesterday's Portland Journal. It is said Mr. Harriman is determined to forestall plans of rival companies in this region at all costs, and that the road from Natron over the Cascades will be the first construction work to be done this fall by the Southern Pacific company in Oregon. It is believed Harriman has learned the plans of two or three other synagogues having intentions on this route, and he has given orders to push the central Oregon line ahead of all other work. More than 61 Southern Pacific surveyors are now making headquarter at the Herbert ranch, on the upper Willamette river, 60 miles east of Eugene. A party of eight more engineers who arrived at Eugene yesterday from San Francisco departed at once to join the camp. They are but a small portion of the total force of engineers who are now trying out every route and pass and following up the preliminary work with the setting of permanent grade stakes. The road will follow the Willamette river and cross the Cascades at or near Crescent lake, where two routes have been surveyed over the summit. Reaching the east slope of the range a branch of the road will go to Klamath Falls while the main line will proceed eastward to meet the Oregon Short Line's projected extension from the Snake river.

It is believed the contracts will be let for this road ahead of contracts for the Drain Coos bay line despite the fact that rats have been delivered on a right of way is being cleared for the latter road. The announcement that bids are wanted on the Oregon Eastern is expected any day.

HOP CONTRACT AT TEN AND A HALF CENTS

A hop contract wherein A. P. Mathews agrees to deliver to Tooe & Co., of Woodburn, 10,000 pounds of 100 hops at 10 1/2 cents a pound, valued with the county clerk today.

The hops are grown on the Alex Mathews place at Pleasant Hill. They are to be delivered at the railroad station not later than October 10th of this year.

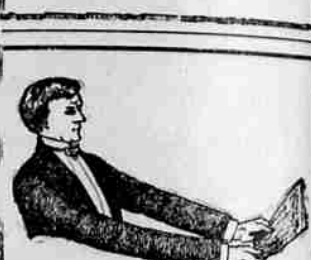
