FRANK MILLER SHOWS UP AT WALTERVILLE

Man Who Created Sensation at Marshfield by Attempting Suicide Follows Wife to Walterville — May Be Feigning Insanity.

Guard readers will remember an item published a few days ago in regard to the attempted suicide of Frank Miller at Marshfield because his wife had left him and returned to her parents at Walterville, this county. Miller followed his wife soon afterward and appeared at Walterville a few days ago. It is said that he begged his wife to return to him but she refused. Yesterday a telephone message was received at the sheriff's office stating that Miller was acting very strangely and asking for advice as to what course to pursue. It was said that after taking a drink of water Miller fell over on a couch and remained there apparently unconscious for several hours. Sheriff Flak replied that if it was thought the man was insane it would be best to swear out a warrant for his arrest and examine him. It was argued that he should be brought to town at once, but up to a late hour this afternoon nothing has been seen of him. It is thought that Miller is feigning insanity or that he is trying to make his wife believe that he will again attempt suicide.
