BLUE RIVER MINING DISTRICT VERY ACTIVE

Representatives of Eastern Capital Have Been Looking Over District With View of Building Railroad to Mines—Various Properties Being Extensively Developed

A correspondent writes the Portland Journal of Blue River mining properties as follows:

The Lucky Boy, which is the pioneer mine of the district, needs no comment, since its past record has proven it to be a very rich mine. The Great Northern, also a producer, located on the Calapooia side of Gold hill, about three miles distant from the Lucky Boy, last month, with but four stamps in commission, took out 28 pounds of bullion.

The Treasure mine, which is now employing 30 men, will soon put on a full crew. On this property has been done some of the most systematic and substantial development work of the state. This property has extensive buildings, an up-to-date mill with monster machinery, which is owned and operated by English capital.

The Blue River Consolidated, incorporated, owned by Colonel Dodge, C. Runyard and others, will soon be a scene of activity, as they expect to begin extensive work in a short time. A small fortune was taken from this property prior to its present ownership.

The Union mine is another producer of the district which is taking out good values, as is also the Wood Diamond mine on Quartz creek.

The Princess group, which is located on the southwest side of Gold hill, near the head of Simmons creek, is owned by W. L. Beckner and Martin Matson. About 400 feet of work which has been done on this property has opened up ledges which carry values from \$3.35 to \$612 per ton.

The Crown Boy, incorporated, another property on the southwest side of Gold hill, on Simmons creek, has had sufficient development work done to prove it a good property. The ledges on this property are very large and average assays give them \$8 per ton.

MONSTER LEDGES.

The Western Oregon Mining & Milling company's mine is located on top of Gold hill and joins the Treasure mine. The work done on this property has opened up some good ledges, which carry values from the surface and promise a great future for the owners. J. E. McCanley will soon begin operations on his property on which 800 feet of development work has been done, which opened up ledges 40 feet in width which average \$1 per ton.

The Great Western Mining & Milling company's property is located on East Quartz creek, through which run the enormous ledges of the Lucky Boy mine. This property has a great future promised, through its good values, fine water power and enormous growth of timber. Ore from this property assays from \$3.50 up into the hundreds per ton.

OPENING RICH DISTRICT.

The Cinderella, Tate Bros., the Christman & Fisher group, the Rowen and Ruby, owned by John Liens of Seattle; the Dexter Sparks group, owned by Roberts & Son; The Cuba, the Alpha, The Chub creek group, the Wright Bros' mine on Jaybird creek, Kyo and Hankinson property, and others, the development of which has shown the vast mineral wealth of the Blue river mining district and proves this without a doubt one of the most desirable districts being opened today from the fact of its economic opportunities for development.

Representatives of eastern capital have been looking over the district lately with the view of building a railroad to Blue river, which event will only be a matter of a short delay, since capital has come to realize the time is now ripe for such investments.

WILL ADD OVER \$750,000 TO TAX ROLL

Lane County Will Be Enriched That Sum or Over by Decision of Supreme Court Declaring Law Exempting Household Goods From Taxation Invalid

The decision rendered by the state supreme court a few days ago declaring unconstitutional and invalid the law exempting from taxation personal property to the amount of \$500 owned by a household will add approximately \$750,000 to Lane county's assessment roll this year.

Assessor H. F. Keeney says the exemptions last year amounted to \$732,655 and he thinks the increase in the assessed valuation of the property this year will bring it up to the first named figure.

The assessment of the county is now being compiled by Assessor Keeney and his deputies will not have to be changed as the exemptions have all been put down on the blanks separately. There will be no extra work as will be the case in several Oregon counties. A number of the assessors will have to do all the work over again, as the exemptions were not put down.

The decision of the supreme court of course will cause considerable complaint among the householders. Last year they were exempt from paying taxes on their personal property to the value of \$500, but the year before, because of the binder in the Shelley law, they had to pungle up.
