PLANS ACCEPTED FOR NEW U. O. BUILDINGS

Y. D. Hensill, of Eugene, Architect for Library and Girls' Dormitory

Contract for Their Construction Will Be Let in August—Library to Be Located Just South of Deady Hall and Dormitory South of President's House

The building committee of the University of Oregon board of regents, consisting of S. H. Friendly, R. S. Bean and M. A. Miller, held a meeting in this city this forenoon for the purpose of approving the plans and specifications for the new library building and the girls' dormitory, an appropriation of \$30,000 for which was made available by the last legislature and the money having been made available by vote of the people at the election on June 4th of this year.

The plans for both buildings were furnished by Architect Y. D. Hensill, of Eugene.

Bids for the construction of the buildings will be advertised for at once and the contract let some time during the month of August. It is expected that work on the buildings will be commenced about September first.

LIBRARY BUILDING.

The library building will be constructed principally of brick at a cost of \$25,000. It will be located south of Deady Hall and next to East Thirtieth street, leaving room enough between the two buildings for the erection of another. It will face east. The dimensions will be 60x10 feet, two stories high with a full basement. The basement will be constructed of artificial stone and the superstructure of buff or cream pressed brick, the same as used in the construction of the Eugene public library, recently completed. All cornices will be of metal and the trimmings, keystones and sill courses of artificial stone to harmonize with the brick. The roof will be of imitation tile.

The first floor will be used entirely for library purposes. There will be a general reading room 30x34 feet, a reference room 30x30, a delivery room 22x36, a stock room 23x46, a periodical room 20x23, besides the librarian's office, catalogue and consultation rooms.

From the lower floor there will be a service stairway leading down to the basement, where will be arranged unpacking rooms, a fire-proof vault for storage of valuable documents and large rooms for the storage of paper files and university catalogues. The remaining space will be allotted to class room purposes.

The second floor will be used for housing of different departments of the university, the rooms being sufficient for at least four of them. In addition there will be a room 26x30 feet, lighted by a skylight and to be used for exhibition purposes.

GIRLS' DORMITORY.

The girls' dormitory or sorority house will be located south of President Campbell's residence, a beautiful site. It will be a frame structure and cost \$5000. There will be 21 rooms besides the usual reception rooms, store rooms, etc. It will be three stories high, 56x90 feet in dimensions and have broad verandas on two sides.

GROUND IMPROVEMENTS.

Besides the matter of erecting the new buildings, that of improving the grounds was discussed. If present plans are carried out the university campus within a few years will be among the finest in the country. The already extensive lawn will gradually be extended in all directions until the whole campus is one vast stretch of green grass. Cement sidewalks, fountains and works of sculpture will adorn the grounds, the trees will be kept neatly and artistically trimmed at all times and many other improvements will be carried out.

This work of course will not all be done at once, but a little at a time will be accomplished, a gradual transformation taking place. At this morning's meeting a cement walk between Villard and Deady Halls was ordered built.

WORK UNDER WAY.

Already 15 or 20 men are at work making improvements in and about the buildings, in the way of building new steps, repainting the roofs, moving the toilets in Villard Hall and making a general cleaning up. From now until late in the fall the campus will present a very busy appearance.

CAR LOAD OF FIRE BRICK FROM INDIANA

A car load of fire brick to be used in the construction of the new gas works now being erected by the Willamette Valley Co., in this city arrived today from Fort Wayne, Indiana. It was set off on the gravel bed spur and immediately unloaded.

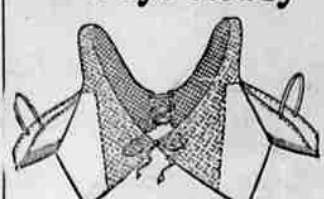
