SEVERAL FOOTBALL GAMES ALREADY ARRANGED FOR

While Schedule Has not Been Com-

pleted Five Games Are in Sight
—Plenty of Good Men Will be
on Hand at Opening of Uni-
versity.

Although the University of Oregon
football schedule for the coming
season has not been completed, Manager
Guy Mount has announced the fol-
lowing games:

October 27—Oregon vs. Idaho, at
Moscow.
November 3—Oregon vs. Willam-
ette, at Eugene.
November 10—Oregon vs. Cor-
vallis, at Corvallis.
November 17—Oregon vs. Washing-
ton, at Eugene.

November 29 (Thanksgiving Day)—
Oregon vs. Multnomah, at Portland.
Two dates, October 20 and Novem-
ber 24, are still open, but it is un-
likely that any game will be sched-
uled on the latter date, as Manager
Mount wishes his men to have a good
rest before the big Thanksgiving
game with Multnomah. Efforts are
being made to secure a game for
October 20, and it is reasonably cer-
tain that some good team will meet
the "varisty on Kircald field that
date. The schedule is limited to six
games. For the past three years
Oregon has played eight games, but
there is a general demand, especially
among football men, for a shorter
schedule.

College will open on September 25
and Captain Chandler expects to be-
gin football practice immediately
thereafter. Coach Hugo Bezdek will
be on hand before college opens and
Trainer "Bill" Hayward is already
here. With the famous Bezdek as
coach and "Bill" Hayward as trainer
the Oregon football men will be as
well coached as any team in the west
this year. The season will begin with
the following old players on hand:
W. G. Chandler, captain and right
end; Gordon C. Moores, left end;
Henry McKinney, right tackle; Olin
Arnsperger, left tackle; Fred C. Moul-
ten, left guard; George W. Hug-
center; John R. Latourette, quar-
terback; Walter McIntyre, substitut-
guard; W. R. Ray, substitute guard;
Bob Hammond, substitute end. Be-
sides these most of the second team
men of last year will be in college,
and there will be a fine lot of mat-
erial in the freshman class.

JOAQUIN MILLER WILL LOCATE ON SIUSLAW

Soon the "poet of the Sierras" may
be known as the "lowest singer of
the Siu-slaw." Joaquin Miller, who
is known by his writings from
Coast to Coast, is in Portland. Ac-
companied by his massive beard, his
unshorn locks and his picturesque
garp, the word painter arrived yester-
day and presented the Hotel Im-
perial with his autograph, says the
Portland Telegram. Long before he
was recognized by the world Joaquin
Miller lived in primitive Oregon, and
in his spare moments as a country
lawyer and school teacher, he turned
out enough verse for George Himes,
Secretary of the Oregon Historical
Society, to print in two thin volumes.
To these were attached the titles,
"Joaquin" and "Specimens." The
"Specimens" panned out and proved
to be the outcroppings of a rich mine
of imagination.

Now, Joaquin Miller returns to his
own people. He has bought a place
on the banks of the turbid Siu-slaw,
where everything is beautiful and
only man is vile. In this beautiful
spot the poet will recreate and write.
It will be his summer home, for in
the winter he will fly south to his
cottage at Fruitvale, Cal.

When fish are not biting, Joaquin
will loiter in his hut overlooking the
Siu-slaw, and dally with the muse.
It is an ideal retreat for him, and the
poet is determined to extract all the
enjoyment possible from it. His
visit to Portland is but a stopover
en route, for Joaquin is now on his way
East to consult with publishers.
The bard has written a new collection
of verse, under the general title of
"Love Is All in All, Love," which
will be placed on the market in the
near future.
