DOUBLE CREW WILL BE PUT ON AT ONCE

Work of Building the Trestle to the Southern Pacific Gravel Bed Across the River Will Be Hastened by the Addition of Large Number of Men

W. Bollins, division engineer of the Southern Pacific Co., spent this forenoon in Eugene, leaving on No. 12 for the north this afternoon. His visit here was for the purpose of looking after the work of constructing the trestle across the river to tap the gravel bed on which the company has recently secured a two-year lease, the gravel to be used in rebuilding the main line and ballasting the new Drain-Coo's Bay and Naton-Klamath lines.

Engineer Bollins at once, what the work was not progressing as rapidly as desired and put in an order for an additional crew to come to Eugene at once to assist in the work and complete it as soon as possible. As stated in yesterday's Guard, trains will probably be running across the trestle within ten or twelve days.

N. Rose, assistant division engineer, arrived here from the south this afternoon on the same train on which Mr. Bollins left for the north.

SOUTHERN OREGON CO'S SAWMILL WILL START

(North Bend Harbor)

Elijah Smith, president of the Southern Oregon Co., arrived Tuesday morning on the Alliance and landed at Empire. He at once announced that he would start up the company's mill at once. It has been eleven years since the mill has run to cut lumber, and then only to saw up logs in the yard. The mill was shut down in 1891 and has been idle for fifteen years, but once each month the machinery is started up and oiled. The Southern Oregon Co., was first organized in 1883, 23 years ago. Altogether the company owns 100,678 acres in Coos and Douglas counties. About one-half of its holdings is well timbered and much of the land is under-laid with coal. The Empire mill is one of the finest in the state and is said to have a capacity of 150,000 feet per day. The resumption of operations at the mill by the Southern Oregon Co. will again make Empire a lively place.

General J. C. Jamison, a Missourian of the old school, is probably the greatest bird lover in Oklahoma. His present home, and is advocating that the state adopt as a part of the curriculum the study of birds and their protection in the public schools.
