Cummins Wins Out

Governor Cummings, of Iowa, who belongs in the Roosevelt-LaFollette class of republican leaders, has won out after a bitter struggle. The "stand-patters", representing the old timers, made a hard fight under the leadership of Geo. D. Perkins, the veteran editor of the Sioux City Journal, a partisan organ of the narrowest hide-bound stamp.

Governor Cummins has given the state a good administration. He favors intelligent tariff revision and desires the election of United States senators by popular vote. He is opposed to Secretary Shaw as a candidate for President and to his political aspirations and plans in general. Governor Cummins is strong, earnest, and progressive. He is upheld by the reform Republicans who would revise the tariff in the interest of protection as well as in that of broader foreign commerce.

Democrats who have hoped for the dawn of a brighter day may still have to wait some time. Iowa is a republican stronghold and can admit of discord without party ruin. It polled 530,000 votes in 1900, of which it gave 307,785 for McKinley and 222,175 for Bryan. It gave Roosevelt a plurality of 158,760 in 1904 on a smaller total vote than in 1900, the Parker, (Dem.) vote being only 140,141, owing in part probably to the influence of William J. Bryan, of Nebraska, who has much to say in Iowa politics.

The present contest is the greatest of the year. It may effect national politics considerably this year and in 1908. President Roosevelt is holding aloof and has made it clear that he will not take any hand in the contest. Iowa has a solid republican delegation in Congress. Senator's Doliver's term expires next year, and it is supposed that Senator Allison will be too feeble to return to Washington.

San Francisco's rehabilitation seems slow but sure—no, so slow either in individual instances. The first permanent brick building in the downtown or "burned" district has just been completed. Twenty-one days ago there was a piece of bare land covered with a mass of brick and twisted pipe. Today a substantial three-story business block covers the lot, and the tenants will move into their offices on August 1st. This is only one instance of the way in which San Franciscans are setting about the rebuilding of their city. Verily, they show their faith by their works, or to put it in the words of a cowboy poet, "they win afore they start."

The republican national committee is sending out appeals for \$1 contributions to help carry on the fall congressional campaign. Since recent disclosures have put an end to life insurance and trust contributions, the republican managers will have an opportunity to sympathize with their impoverished democratic opponents. At one dollar a head it takes a lot of hustling to raise a slush fund that amounts to very much.

W. E. Corey, head of the steel trust, is said to have paid his wife \$3,000,000 in order to get her to consent to a divorce that he might marry an actress. Since Mrs. Corey once sewed patches on her husband's pants and

darned his socks, when he was working for \$40 a month, she was no doubt entitled to a fair share of the millions that he is now squandering on the fast set that always gathers around the lobster millionaire.

The talk about arresting John D. Rockefeller seems to have been all a bluff after all. The oil magnate is at his home now, playing golf, and apparently enjoying life. The stories of the millionaire dodging and hiding to keep out of the way of warrant servers seems to have been all a lot of yellow newspaper stuff, and is a pretty fair sample of the reliability of publications of the well-known Hearst variety.

The trustees of the Eugene school district are considering the establishing of a department of music and drawing. This it would seem is a move in the right direction and it is not too early to make the start. We have good public schools but they can be made better by the addition of such departments as that now under consideration.

By Professor F. W. TAUSSIG of Harvard University

IS it conceivable that he who directs an industrial enterprise with success and thereby gains a fortune may be induced to labor WITH EQUAL ZEAL and efficiency in public business? Can the great capacities of the captain of industry be turned directly and unquestionably to the general good? Certain it is that some at least of the great industries of modern times would be carried on to greater advantage for the community if conducted as public enterprises UNDER ABLE MANAGEMENT. Here is the essence of the problem: Can able management be secured?

We may feel reasonably sure that for a considerable proportion of those who have the gifts of leadership the attractions of public service are powerful enough. Given opportunity for the exercise of these gifts of leadership and the leaders OF THE RIGHT STAMP will not be lacking.

The best hope for improving the machinery of government lies in lengthening the terms of service for the administrative officers; in reducing the number of elected officials and enlarging the appointing power; in simplifying the machinery of municipal and state government, PERHAPS OF THE NATIONAL GOVERNMENT AS WELL.
