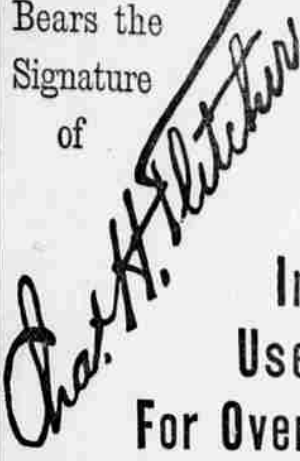

BUMPER WHEAT CROP REPORTED IN COUNTY

First New Grain to Be Delivered Arrived at Springfield Mill This Morning—Wheat Averaged 30 Bushels to the Acre—Encouraging Report From Threshers

B. A. Washburne, of the Springfield flour mills, was in the city today. He informed a Guard reporter that the first wheat of the season arrived at the mill this morning, two loads having been brought in by M. F. Rose, who conducts the Johnson place, formerly known as the McKenzie stock farm several miles east of Springfield. Mr. Washburne said the wheat was plump and heavy and it averaged 30 bushels to the acre, which is a splendid yield.

The Armitage brothers, who are operating a threshing machine in that vicinity, say that all wheat threshed so far is turning out well, from 20 to 30 bushels to the acre. Fall oats average 35 bushels and spring oats 25 bushels to the acre.

Reports from one or two other threshers that are in operation in the county indicate that the yield is generally good, far above that of last year.

PORTLAND MARKET REPORT

Front Street, Aug. 1.—The principal features of the Portland wholesale markets today are:

Grain bags are quoted lower. Wheat drops a cent a bushel. Little selling of -id flour. Reported that Durst sold hops low. Bean prices slightly changed. Light peel of chittim bark. Plum market is in bad way. Salmon run much improved. Tomato market ranging lower. Eggplant in heavy supply.

WHEAT DROPS A CENT A BUSHEL

The wheat market is 1c a bushel lower today for both old and new crop. The decline is not due to any improvement in crop prospects here, but to constant breaks in the markets both in the east and in Europe. But a small amount of trading is reported at the new figure.

For the new-crop flour the prices have considerably stiffened of late. The price of wheat, even with today's decline of 1c, is higher than when first contracts on the new crop were made by at least 2c per bushel. Some small amount of foreign business was reported today on a basis of \$3.15 for old-crop flour, but for the new crop the price is about 5c higher than that amount. New-crop flour opened this season at \$3 a barrel for exports.

REPORTED DURSTS SELL HOPS LOW.

Special information believed to be reliable, comes to The Journal that M. H. Durst, the big California operator who secured consignments of hops in this city, has sold 1,100 bales in London market at 11c. The report cannot be confirmed. Reports from New York received this morning state that the crop there is looking better than at any time in recent years. Continental crop advices are considerably better than a week ago. No new transactions in contracts are reported.

LIGHT PEEL OF CHITTIM BARK.

According to handlers, the peel of chittim bark this season is the lightest in recent years. The low price offered and the heavy supplies carried over from the previous two years by speculators is the cause. Demand is quite fair from the east, but prices are inactive.
