FAIRMOUNT WANTS FREE CITY MAIL DELIVERY

Citizens Have Circulated Petition Asking Postoffice Department to Extend Service to That Suburb--Inspector May Be in Eugene Within Short Time

The people of Fairmount are circulating a petition asking the post-office department to extend the city free delivery to that suburb. The petition of course is unanimously signed but the next question is, will the department grant it? One of the requirements for free delivery is enough sidewalks so that the carrier may be able to make his route without having to wade through mud in winter or dust in summer and so that he can make a continuous route without having to retrace his footsteps. Other suburbs as well as Fairmount are anxious to get the service extended to their localities but until the conditions above obtain, it will be useless to petition for the service.

Word has reached here than an inspector of the postoffice department would be in Eugene within a short time to investigate the feasibility of extending the delivery system to the suburbs and it may be possible that at least a portion of Fairmount and one or two other outlying districts may be successful in securing the extension. If the people of the suburbs would show their appreciation of this new move by the government by beginning to make provisions to build new walks where there are none, it is believed that there will be no difficulty in securing this much needed improvement in the delivery of mail in this city. In case the service is extended one or two additional carriers will be needed.
