MORE COPPER PROSPECTS FOUND ABOVE CRESWELL

George Sears' 1,400-Acre Farm Has
Been Bonded for Period of Two
Years by California Men, Who
Will at Once Sink a Prospect
Shaft

For several weeks there has been something of a mining excitement in the county over the announcement that rich veins of copper had been discovered and that too in the Willamette Valley near the river. The first prospect hole was sunk near Creswell but on the opposite side of the river from that place. A shaft was started and miners are now at work there twenty or twenty five feet down. Assays of the ore have been made, and a quantity has been sent to the smelter. Reports from this have not been given out but the owners keep drilling and are not offering stock for sale. From this as a starting point prospectors began exploring the county southward bearing east. On the farm of George Sears, east bank of the Willamette opposite Walker's Station, "croppings" were found.

These were traced by F. H. Hall of San Francisco and Charles B. Bennett of Redding, California, and were found to be so extensive that further and more thorough prospecting seemed justifiable. Messrs. Hall and Bennett therefore have bonded George Sears' 1400 acres in the sum of \$25,000 for a period of two years. In the meantime they can prospect. The gentlemen are quite sanguine that there is a rich copper vein on the land. The ore is black oxide, the most valuable copper ore known.

Bennett is a trained miner and is now on the "claim" looking for the most suitable place for beginning development work. He will probably not return till the middle or the last of next week. It is proposed to at once commence sinking a prospect shaft. After depth has been reached, cross cutting will show the width of the vein. Messrs. Hall and Bennett say they do not know what they have nor will they know before digging. If the mine is there, there are big things for Cottage Grove, since it is only about four miles to the George Sears farm. A smelter will be at once built where not only the copper ore will be treated but all the base ores from Bohemia as well. Indeed the Bohemia ores will be used as a flux and smelted without cost to the Bohemia miner.

Hopes are high now and the return of Mr. Bennett is impatiently awaited.—Cottage Grove Western Oregon.

The steamer Roscoe went to Coos Bay Wednesday evening. When she returns she will tow up the Wascola to load with lumber.

A. M. Best and family arrived here from Eugene, Saturday, on their way to North Fork. They purchased the Elza Morris place several months ago and intend to make it their home.

The Saubert company are putting their mill in order and have placed their new boilers in position. They expect to begin sawing in about ten days.

On complaint of Wallace Chamberlain, deputy state game warden, I. H. King was arrested at Alsea charged with having venison in his possession in violation of the law. Justice Wakefield sentenced him to a fine of \$25 and costs making \$28.50 in all.

Messrs. W. W. and S. M. Calkins and their families of Eugene were encamped at the mouth of the river several days this week.

Glenn Dowell, the 14 year old son of O. Dowell had the misfortune to cut his left foot severely yesterday. He was working with an ax when in some way he struck the outer part of his foot below the instep cutting off the leaders and bones connecting with two of the toes.

Work of building a temporary rack in the river above the mouth of Lake Creek was commenced Wednesday morning. The object in building the rack at that point is to prevent the salmon from ascending the river further and make them go up Lake Creek where they can be used at the hatchery.

Wm. Kyle & Sons have had a crew busy fitting up their cold storage rooms. The walls have been boarded up with several thicknesses of lumber and building paper, enclosing eight inches of sawdust and three inches of air space. The floor is also laid with double plank and sawdust besides an air space, and the ceiling will be similarly protected against changes of temperature. In addition the floor will be calked and pitched.
