GRINDING LANE COUNTY PAINT AT SALEM

Oregon Sienna Paint Company,
With Mines Near Walker, Ready
for Operations at Capital City—
Carload of Raw Sienna There
Ready To Grind

The Oregon Sienna Paint Company is about ready to grind. In truth it has already been grinding, in a small way, and is preparing to enlarge its operations. They have already a burr grinder and mixer, and they are adding a roller grinder and an improved mixer, besides other new machinery all the latest and best.

The company occupies the building on Trade and High streets that was formerly the Lehmann cash and door factory.

They have a twenty horsepower electric motor to run their machinery. The sienna in its raw state comes from four miles north of Cottage Grove, in Lane county, two miles west of Walker, where the company now owns and controls sixty-two acres, which has sienna averaging forty-five feet deep, and in which there are forty-two distinct colors.

There is a carload of raw sienna in the Salem factory now, ready for grinding, as soon as all the new machinery is installed, which will be within a few days, or at the latest a few weeks. Six or seven more cars

CHARLES F. MUSER DIES FROM INJURIES

Aged Real Estate Dealer Could Not Survive Injury Received in Fall on Sidewalk Short Time Ago

Charles F. Muser, the aged real estate dealer, who was injured by falling on the cement sidewalk in front of Barker's store on East Ninth street July 21, died at his home, 172 West Eighth street, this morning at three o'clock, after suffering intensely since the accident. One of his hip bones was broken and on account of his advanced age his physicians at once saw that it was not likely that he would recover.

The deceased was born at Baden, Germany, over 78 years ago. Being of poor parentage he was compelled to work in factories while very young and when he became of age served three years and four months in the German regular army. He came to the United States in 1867, landing at Philadelphia, where he worked in a sugar refinery for over five years. He then came to the Pacific coast, settling in California. After a few years residence there he came to Oregon and bought a farm in the river bottom. Losing heavily by floods he came to Eugene a number of years ago and became engaged in the real estate business. He was known as a practical and honest man in his business dealings. It is said that \$5 was his fee for selling a piece of property, whether it was large or small. He had a large amount of property listed. The deceased was of a religious turn of mind and upright in all things.

The funeral will be held tomorrow forenoon at 10 o'clock in Gordon's undertaking rooms, the services to be conducted by Rev. E. A. Child. The body will be interred in the I. O. O. F. cemetery, beside that of his wife.

BIG IRRIGATION SCHEME ON FOOT

Fleming, Buoy and Associates
Have Canal Project
Under Way

Portland Capital Interested in Scheme
to Water Big Area of Land South
and West of Eugene - Proposed
Canal Will Pass Within a Mile
and Half of City Limits.

The filing of a water right on the Coast Fork of the Willamette river by Mark Fleming and John Buoy, as mentioned in Saturday's Guard, is the second step in a big irrigation scheme which is proposed by these men and their associates, the first step being the preliminary surveys for the main ditch or canal, made some time ago.

For several months past Messrs. Fleming and Buoy have been quietly working on this scheme and have been successful in interesting Portland capital in the project. It is now announced that work on the dam at the intake of the proposed canal will be commenced within a few days and work on the canal will be well under way before the summer is over. It is proposed to complete it inside of two years.

PASS NEAR EUGENE.

The canal will have its source at a point on the Coast Fork a short distance from Goshen. It will then proceed in a northerly direction to the east slope of Spencer's Butte, where a big reservoir, to be used for the storage of the water, will be built. The canal will then proceed in a northerly direction to the Coyote Creek country, passing about a mile and a half south and southwest of Eugene. Proceeding in the same direction it will empty into the Willamette river below Junction City. A tunnel about 150 feet long will have to be built through a portion of the east slope of Spencer's Butte, but according to the surveys an easy route with a good fall is obtainable the remainder of the distance. As stated in the Guard's item Saturday the length of the canal will be about fifteen miles.

The Guard is informed that the right-of-way for a considerable portion of the ditch has already been secured. Some of the farmers through whose places it will extend are willing to donate the right-of-way, knowing that irrigation will be a great benefit to them, but there are others who demand fancy prices for the small strip of land that the canal will occupy.

WELL FINANCED.

The promoters of the project are very sanguine of its success. The Portland capitalists who have promised to finance the enterprise have plenty of money and are willing to put up all that is necessary to dig every foot of the canal.

A company will soon be organized and incorporated and operations on a large scale are expected to soon begin. Definite plans are not yet ready to be given out, but it is presumed the company will build lateral ditches wherever they are needed or called for to accommodate the farmers along the route of and in proximity to the proposed main canal.

The Guard is promised further particulars as to the exact route of the canal, the location and dimensions of the reservoir, the location of the tunnel and other matters in the near future.

NEW REFUSE BURNER AT WENDLING MILL

The Booth-Kelly Lumber Co. has begun the construction of a large refuse burner at the Wendling mill similar to the one at the Springfield mill. The 125,000 brick to be used will be furnished by Martin & Cook, of this city, who will begin delivering them immediately.
