

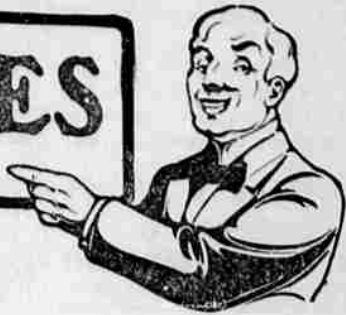

RECEIVER IS NAMED FOR BROKEN BANK

John C. Fetzler, Foremost Capitalist, Appointed Upon Petition of Two Small Depositors—Defaulting Officials Are Believed to Be in Canada

Chicago, Aug. 7.—John C. Fetzler, a prominent capitalist, was appointed receiver today of the Milwaukee Avenue state bank, with a bond of \$1,000,000, upon the application of two women depositors whose balances amount to less than \$300.

A warrant has been issued charging President Paul O. Stensland with the acceptance of deposits after he knew the bank to be insolvent. Stensland and Cashier Herring are still absent and the police are inclined to the belief that they are in Canada.

Examiner Jones is still unable to announce the amount of the shortage in the cashier's accounts.

(This is a state bank and not a savings bank, as stated in the headlines in yesterday's Guard.)

CHARLES NICKELL'S SEVERE SENTENCE

Portland, Or., Aug. 7.—Charles Nickell, newspaper publisher and former United States commissioner at Medford, was sentenced yesterday afternoon by Judge Hunt to 13 months' imprisonment on McNeill's Island. No fine was imposed.

The crime for which Nickell was convicted was conspiracy to suborn perjury in connection with the Miller-Kiueart land fraud conspiracy. Harry W. Miller and Frank E. Kincart are now serving one year on McNeill's Island for the same offense. Martin G. Hoge, city attorney of Medford, was another of the conspirators. He is now serving four months in the county jail. His sentence also included a fine of \$500.

Nickell was accompanied to court this yesterday by his counsel, Judge Thomas O'Day. When Nickell was called to stand, he spoke as follows in his own behalf:

"I am fully conscious of my own innocence and believe I was wrongfully convicted. I did nothing knowingly to violate the law, and if I had known of the existence of that contract I would not have accepted those applications."

The contract referred to was one by which Miller agreed on behalf of the mythical Emmittsburg company of New Zealand to purchase timber claims from entrymen whom he had induced to pay from \$25 to \$50 as a location fee. Nickell's connection with the conspiracy consisted in encouraging persons to file on claims and in knowingly permitting them to swear that they were taking up land for their own benefit and had made no agreement to dispose of it.

Judge Hunt in imposing sentence said to Nickell: "The jury must have found that you knew the existence of the contract. The whole scheme was viciously fraudulent, and the aggravating feature is your participation in it. One word, one caution, one warning from you as United States commissioner and the whole conspiracy would have been interrupted and you would have been spared this humiliation. You do not know how painful it is to me to impose a severe sentence."

Then again calling attention to the magnitude of the offense, Judge Hunt sentenced Nickell to 13 months on McNeill's Island. The bond was fixed at \$2000, but pending an appeal Nickell was released on his present bond, \$4000.

IOWA DEMOCRATS IN CONVENTION

Waterloo, Iowa, Aug. 7.—The conservatives are in control of the convention of Democrats, which was called to order at 2 o'clock this afternoon. The governorship contest has narrowed down to George Ball, John Denison and Claude Porter. Bryan will be endorsed for president.

RUSSIAN STRIKE IS CALLED OFF BY WORKINGMEN

Capital Is Quiet and Orderly and Work Is Being Resumed in Factories—Government Is Overjoyed at New Turn of Affairs and Czar Will Form New Ministry—Mutineers Are Being Shot by Wholesale at Sveaborg Fortress

St. Petersburg, Aug. 7.—The workmen's council has decided to call off the strike in this city and will make the announcement tonight. It is believed that the provinces will follow this action, also. The government is overjoyed at the turn of affairs and holds trains loaded with soldiers, ready for dispatch to needed points. The warships in the harbor will carry foreign mails in event of a general strike.

The Official Gazette announced today that it is informed that the czar will change his cabinet on Thursday and that Prince Lvoff will be made premier, Count Heyden minister of the interior and M. Stakovich minister of finance. It is also announced that the czar has decided to allow the douma next March to supervise the budget for 1907.

The city is quiet, the strikers having dispersed and no gatherings being permitted. Work has been resumed in many factories.

SHOOTING MUTINEERS.

Helsingfors, Aug. 7.—The captured revolutionists were turned over to the Finnish authorities to be tried and punished by imprisonment, according to Finnish law. The shooting of men condemned for participating in the mutiny at Sveaborg continues at that fortress.

TEAMSTERS MEET UNDER HEAVY GUARD

Chicago, Aug. 7.—Under a heavy guard of police and a reserve of plain clothes men outside, the teamsters' convention was resumed today. Protests have been filed against the seating of the San Francisco delegates, as it is alleged their credentials are irregular.

LARGEST CITIES IN POINT OF AREA

Washington, August 7.—The census report, issued today, shows that New York City is the largest in its land area, being 269,218 acres; New Orleans is second, with 125,000 acres; Chicago is third, Philadelphia fourth and Duluth fifth.

After Ice Trust

SOUTHERN NATIONS FAVOR ARBITRATION

Resolutions Adopted by Pan-American Congress Urging World-Wide Arbitration of Differences Between Nations—Passed by Acclamation at Rio Janeiro

Rio Janeiro, Aug. 7.—The arbitration committee of the Pan-American congress today considered a resolution urging all countries represented to send to The Hague delegates instructed to make every effort for a general arbitration convention. The resolution was adopted by acclamation, as the first great step of the congress. The preamble expounds the principle of arbitration and points out the fact that the congress is not the proper place for the discussion of a matter of such world-wide importance.

The method of transmitting the resolution to The Hague was left to the arbitration committee.

MANY WITNESSES IN OIL INQUIRY

Chicago, Aug. 7.—Fifteen witnesses, summoned to testify before the grand jury in the Standard Oil investigation, were questioned by the government attorneys this afternoon preparatory to their appearance when the delayed jury is final empaneled. New jurors, called to take the places of those failing to appear, answered the summons today.

WOMAN SENTENCED TO BE HANGED

Stockton, Cal., Aug. 7.—Emma Ledoux was today sentenced to hang at San Quentin prison October 19th next. She was unmoved by the sentence. Mrs. Ledoux murdered her husband, Albert McVicar, whose body was found packed in a trunk at the Stockton depot.

HEAT SITUATION SOMEWHAT BETTER

New York, Aug. 7.—The humidity is less today and the death rate from heat is lower. Relief is expected soon. Five deaths were reported today, making a total of twenty-one deaths since the hot spell begun.

Czarina as Caricaturist

The recent disorders in Russia have brought the royal family of that unhappy country prominently before the attention of the world. The czar, or empress, has many accomplishments and is noted among other things for her cleverness as a caricaturist. During the war with Japan



she drew some caricatures of Japanese warriors, which were recently published in Russian papers. Togo, Oyama, Kuroki and others were thus portrayed by the clever pen of the empress, who does not spare even the czar himself from occasional playful ridicule in this manner.

Oregon News

Carl Neuschwander has just cleared more on forty-three acres of land than the property cost him. The record is 10,000 pounds of Alsike clover, a total of \$2400. The cost was \$1 a bushel for threshing and the seed for sowing, about \$400 in all, showing a profit of \$2000 on the 45 acres, certainly a record that speaks for diversified farming. And this was only a part of the business of Mr. Neuschwander's farm.—Albany Democrat.

Mr. Gorton, of Willow Creek, was in Arlington a few days ago. He informs the Record that he has finished heading his grain, and instead of having \$3000 worth, as he anticipated before the hot weather, he will have about \$1500 worth. Mr. Gorton has lived in the county a great many years and has never seen so long a siege of hot weather or so universal damage to the crops in Gilliam county.—Arlington Record.

At Glendale, in a fit of despondency, Chas. McGinnis shot himself with 32-40 rifle last Saturday. The scene of the shooting was on the bank of Cow creek, a few rods from the old Palmer ranch near the Meadows, now occupied by Wm. Ruggles. One bullet entered the lower part of his chest, shattering a rib and causing a very ugly wound, and the other bullet entered the roof of the mouth and lodged in the head. McGinnis died shortly after the shooting.
