### APPLICANTS FOR CERTIFICATES

The regular mid-summer examination of applicants for teachers' certificates is in progress at the Central school building, having begun this morning. County Superintendent W. B. Dillard is being assisted by Professor M. H. Arnold, Professor H. C. Baughman and W. G. Martin, the last named having charge of the applicants for state certificates.

For county papers 61 applicants appeared this morning and seven made application for state certificates.

The latter class is expected to be increased in numbers before the day is over.

This is a smaller class than the average and Superintendent Dillard thinks that there will be a scarcity of teachers in the county this fall. Several outlying districts were unable to secure teachers for the spring term and the outlook for the fall term seems even worse.

### Oregon State News

The survey of the proposed electric line from Salem to Mehama and Mill City is progressing. The permanent survey is now being made and right of way is being secured. The road is to be built immediately and will open up a fine section of country. The enterprise is said to be backed by men amply able to supply all the capital required.

The Oregonian has completed a statement concerning the Northwest wheat crop for last year, which says that the 1906 wheat crop in Oregon, Washington and Idaho reached a grand total of 51,874,727 bushels, exceeding that of any preceding year by more than 5,000,000 bushels, the nearest approach to these figures being in 1901, when the crop amounted to nearly 47,000,000 bushels. The figures on the final turn out have been compiled with great care from official sources, the publication being delayed later than usual in order to receive the complete railroad reports of stocks on hand at the close of the season.

E. P. Tobin, the well-known traveling representative of the Pacific Paper Co., of Portland, and a Mr. Hodson, of Grants Pass, have entered into partnership with J. W. Baker, proprietor of the Medford and Grants Pass laundries, and purchased the Ashland laundry. The three gentlemen will form a corporation with a capital stock of \$10,000.
