HARD BLOW TO SAWMILLS OF LANE COUNTY

Southern Pacific Company Will Carry
No More Ties for Gould's Western Pacific Railroad—Fifteen Mills Tributary to Cottage Grove Are Sawing the Ties

F. H. Hall, purchasing agent of the Western Pacific railroad, who has been buying railroad ties at Cottage Grove for the past fortnight and had placed orders for 60,000 ties, received advices Tuesday morning last that the Southern Pacific will not receive for shipment any more structural timber for his road. The Western Pacific is a Gould road and is building a track from Oakland, Cal., to Salt Lake, Utah. On the contract for the 60,000 ties fifteen mills tributary to Cottage Grove are sawing. The cut reduced to board measure is 2,240,000 feet. It is not stated what price he is paying, but reading the market it must be somewhere around \$12 per thousand, or for the order near \$27,000. If this contract is cancelled Cottage Grove is out that money. A second contract for 100,000 ties was negotiating. These measure a little over 3,753,000 feet of lumber, worth \$44,080. Cottage Grove lies that out-right and the short-eighted S. P. Co., through its New York management, loses pay for the haul.

It is not enough for the S. P. Co. to say that the Lane county timber is in its territory and will be water on its wheel whether it drops now or fifty years hence. The company must know that it is only 300 miles across country to a competing railroad connection, this very same Western Pacific. The building of the Gould road will not be suspended though its completion may be delayed. Timber agents will go to the coast, Coos Bay, Tillamook and Washington water shipping points, by lumber and ship by water to Oakland. The company's own construction trains will carry it to the inland country to the east.

The Southern Pacific Company explains its instruction to agents that material will not be received for shipment when routed for the Western Pacific, Rio Grande or Denver & Rio Grande unless those companies furnish cars. If those roads furnish cars the S. P. Co. will pull them over its tracks.

In further explanation the S. P. Co. states that it is short of cars for the traffic in its own territory, then for its own equipment it has an order in for four months, unfilled for the reason it has no cars. But the company will resume carrying freight for competing lines as soon as it has cars.

It is, as has before been claimed in these columns, a fact that the New York head office, Harriman, does not furnish its Oregon officials with equipment to handle the business in the immense Oregon territory. They are making money for the company, but they might make more if they were furnished the equipment. This car shortage question will become so acute that it will demand and have national legislation. The big systems ought to voluntarily solve the problem before the government compels a solution. Harriman ought to suspend his Puget Sound grasping and give attention to his Oregon territory—Western Oregon.

NO PARDON FOR COURTLAND GREEN

District Attorney Brown Enters Vigorous Objection to Release of Lane County Murderer from State Prison

Salem, Or., Aug. 10.—There is no likelihood that a pardon or commutation of sentence will be granted Courtland Green, the Lane county murderer, in whose behalf a plea of innocence has recently been made. District Attorney George M. Brown has entered a vigorous objection, closing with the remark that there is too much murder in Oregon, and that the law should be permitted to take its course.

Courtland Green and his co-defendant, Claude Branton, who was hanged, were little more than boys at the time they killed John Linn in a most cold-blooded manner in Eastern Lane county in 1898. The recent murder of an old man in the same county by two other boys serves to emphasize Brown's comment upon the prevalence of the lawless spirit in this state.
