The two local companies of the Oregon National Guard have all their equipment in readiness for the big encampment at American Lake, near Tacoma, Wash., which begins Monday, August 13, and continues for ten days. The companies will leave on the local train tomorrow morning. At Portland they will be joined by the Third regiment, O. N. G., and proceed on a special train for Murray, where the Oregon troops will camp.

MAJOR YORAN'S STAFF.

8000 MEN IN CAMP.

There will be two camps, one at Murray and the other at Nisqually, three miles distant. The combined camps will be commanded by General Thurston and the divisions and Murray and Nisqually will be commanded by Colonel Carman, of the Seventh U. S. Infantry, and Colonel Maus, of the Twentieth U. S. Infantry, respectively.

The following organizations, comprising about 8000 men, will participate in the maneuvers:

The National Guard of Oregon, Washington, Montana and Idaho; the Third, Seventh, Fourteenth, Twentieth and Twenty-second regiments of U. S. Infantry, entire; the Second and Fourteenth regiments of U. S. Cavalry; the First, Ninth, Seven-

teenth, Eighteenth and Twenty-fourth batteries of U. S. Field Artillery; the First battalion of U. S. Engineers; Signal Corps and Hospital Corps.

PROGRAM FOR THE FIRST WEEK.

Following is the program for the first week of the maneuvers:
Monday, August 13—Regimental exercises.

Tuesday, August 14—Brigade exercises.

Wednesday, August 15—Exercises preliminary to grand maneuvers.

Thursday, August 16—Commencement of hostilities. Opposing troops, militia and regulars, will commence operations against each other and bivouac at night.

Friday, August 17—Continuation of hostilities. A big day in the encampment.
