GREAT RECEPTION TO WM. J. BRYAN

Portland, Or., Aug. 11.—With Governor Chamberlain possibly at the head, a large representation of Oregon Democrats will be among the thousands to welcome William J. Bryan when he lands in New York the latter part of this month. There will be a dozen or more in the party that will go from Portland and Oregon, and it is planned to have all the larger cities of the state represented in the delegation.

Among those who are considering becoming members of the party are: Governor Chamberlain, Alex Sweeney, Portland; Will R. King, Ontario; W. F. Butcher, Baker City; J. H. Raley, Pendleton; John H. Smith, Astoria; M. A. Miller, Lebanon; J. D. Matlock, of Eugene, and J. L. Boone, of Grants Pass.

RECEPTION COMMITTEE.

New York, Aug. 10.—At a meeting of the executive committee of the William J. Bryan reception committee yesterday the following additional members were elected:

Colonel A. C. Drinkwater, of Massachusetts; ex-Governor Benton McMillin, of Tennessee; State Senator Thomas F. Grady, of New York; Arthur Ducey and Jacob Rupert, Thomas F. Smith was chosen as recording secretary to serve at the reception at Madison Square Garden.

Judge Feltner reported that an effort would be made to seat all state delegations as far as possible.

George W. Sweeney, chairman of the committee on hotel arrangements, reported that from what he had learned at least 500 people would come from Nebraska to welcome Mr. Bryan on his return to America.

BRYAN'S ONLY RIVAL FOR LEADERSHIP



WILLIAM RANDOLPH HEARST.

Wm. Randolph Hearst, owner of the great Hearst newspaper syndicate, is regarded as the only real rival of Wm. J. Bryan for the Democratic nomination for president. Hearst, in an interview recently declared himself out of the race, but it is generally believed in political circles that he desires nomination and election to the New York governorship only as a stepping stone to higher honors. At present it looks as though he would be able to force the New York democracy, with the assistance of the Tammany organization, to run him as

its candidate for governor, and once nominated without a party split, his chances of election are thought to be exceedingly bright.

"There has not been a case in years," says the Springfield, Mass., Republican, Ind., "so completely illustrating a hold-up of a great political party as Hearst's tightening grip upon the New York democracy. We wish that there were some other solution of the political problem so obvious that it could be pointed out, but at present the somewhat sinister figure of Hearst fills the Democratic horizon of the Empire State."

PROCLAMATION.
Whereas, There was submitted to the electors of the state at the last general election as required by law an initiative petition for a proposed amendment to Section 2 of Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Oregon, giving cities and towns exclusive power to enact and amend their charters, subject to the constitution and criminal laws of the State of Oregon, and
Whereas, on the 25th day of June 1906 the Secretary of State in my presence as Governor of the State of Oregon did cause the votes given for and against said amendment and wherein, it was ascertained and determined upon such canvass that there were 32,567 votes cast for said amendment and 19,852 votes against the same, and that said amendment received an affirmative majority of the total number of effective votes cast thereon and entitled to be counted under the provisions of law,
Now, therefore, I, George E. Chamberlain, as Governor of the State of Oregon, in obedience to and by virtue of the power and authority vested in me by law, do hereby make and issue this proclamation to the people of the State of Oregon, and do announce and declare that the whole number of votes cast in the State of Oregon at said election for and against said proposed amendment was as hereinbefore stated, and that said proposed amendment received an affirmative majority of the total number of votes cast thereon and entitled to be counted under the provisions of law, and that said amendment hereinafter mentioned shall be and is in full force and effect as a part of the constitution of the State of Oregon from the date of this proclamation.
