### JOSEPH DEYULIO A HAPPY MAN

Lane County Italian Residing Near Junction United With His Family After Absence of Twenty Years

Junction City, Or., Aug. 13.—The happiest man in Oregon is Joseph Deyulio, who lives eight miles west of this place. Twenty years ago he was a resident of Campobasso, Repobottini, Italy, where he was married to Maria Marozzese. Leaving his bride of a few months he shipped as a sailor to America to seek his fortune, after which he was to send for his wife.

After reaching the United States he went to work with the one idea in view of saving enough money to send for his wife. In a few months his wife wrote him of the arrival of a little dark-eyed daughter, who had come to bless their home when she reached America. In a few months Deyulio had saved enough money to bring his wife and baby to him. This he sent to her in Italy expecting she would come at once. His wife was living with his mother, who wish-

ed her son to return to Italy to live, and she thought if she could persuade her daughter-in-law to remain, her son would return. She borrowed the money sent to buy the tickets with and spent it for other things, hence the wife and babe had nothing to buy a ticket with to America.

She wrote Deyulio of this and he was so disgusted that he refused to send any more money, hence for 18 years they have been separated by the ocean. About two years ago Deyulio's mother died and his wife then wrote him it was her desire to come to the country. He, remembering his first experience in sending money, thought it the safest way to send her a ticket for herself and daughter. This he did, and after many delays in proving his American citizenship and his ability to care for them when they arrived in this country, he at last got them. They arrived here last week. His daughter, whom he had never seen, had married and was left a widow with one small babe, which she brought with her.

Deyulio has a farm of 80 acres of good land and it is well stocked with goats, sheep and cows.

### FIRE ENGINE FOR CITY OF FLORENCE

Ordered at Last Meeting of City Council—Salmon Canneries on Siuslaw Getting Ready for the Fall Pack

The city council of Florence at the regular meeting last Monday evening voted to purchase a hand fire engine with 500 feet of hose and a cart, from A. G. Long, of Portland, for \$1300, delivered at Yaquina.

Wednesday evening while one of the donkey engines at the Hurd logging camp was being loaded on a scow at the mouth of Hadsall Creek preparatory to taking it up to Knowles Creek the scow in some way slipped back from the bank letting the engine into the river. A crew of men worked there nearly all night and succeeded in getting the engine back on the bank.

Mr. Gibson who operated the Hurd cannery last fall, arrived here from Portland the first of the week and is busy putting the cannery in order for business the coming season. This indicates that there is likely to be some competition for purchasing the fish caught on this stream this season, that ought to be of advantage to the fishermen. Wm. Kyle & Sons Co. will have their cannery and cold storage plant ready for business in a few days more. The two establishments will be in the market for fish, and the men ought to get better prices for their catch than is usually the case where the business is all in the hands of one individual.—The West.

# BIG FOREST FIRE UP MOHAWK RIVER

Logging Firm of Renninger & Button Lose Several Thousand Dollars

Their New Chute Destroyed and Fire Passed over Several Million Feet of Their Yarded Logs.—Another Blaze at the Mouth of Winberry Creek

Forest fires are burning in the vicinity of Mahee, above the Wendling mill on the Mohawk, and near the mouth of Winberry creek on Fall creek. Both are in the vicinity of Booth-Kelly timber, but so far no great amount of damage is reported.

Both fires started about the same time Saturday evening. Within a few hours after the discovery a veritable army of men was fighting each and through their efforts the fires have been prevented from spreading to the green timber.

The fire up the Mohawk destroyed several hundred feet of logging road and chute belonging to Renninger & Button, but aside from this no damage has been done, as dead trees and underbrush have been the fuel for the flames. Reports from there today state that the fire is now in the open and is thought to be completely under control.

The Winberry fire is also reported to be under the control of the fighters and no green timber has been burned.

The excellent system of fire patrol maintained in this county by the Booth Kelly Co., the Weyerhaeuser and Wentworth timber concerns, the Southern Pacific Co. and others prevents any serious fires, such as are reported from the eastern end of Linn county, where at least one village has been wiped out and great damage done within the past three days. The system in Lane county is so well organized that within a very short time after a fire is discovered scores of men are on hand to stamp it out.

### LOSS IS BIG.

Since the above was written and set up the Guard learns from a number of Eugene people who have just returned from a fishing trip up the Mohawk that the fire there is much more serious than was at first reported. Renninger & Button's log chute, which was 4000 feet long and which was recently built at a cost of nearly \$4000, has been almost entirely destroyed. It had been in use only three days. The firm had 15,000,000 feet of logs yarded in that vicinity and the fire has spread over them, entailing a big loss, the amount being hard to estimate, but it is thought to be in the neighborhood of \$7000.

The fire started near 12 o'clock Saturday night, supposedly from one of the donkey engines, but the engineer states that before quitting work he put out every spark of fire. The alarm was given and soon a large number of men from the Wendling and Hyland mills were on the scene doing their best to stay the flames, but with little success.

The Eugene men say it was about the worst fire they ever saw. The roar of the flames could be heard several miles and heat felt hundreds of yards.

The loss on the logs falls on Renninger & Button, as they had not yet delivered them to the mills.
