CITY FATHERS HOLD REGULAR MONTHLY SESSION

Usual Grist of Business Transacted

Alton Hampton Asks Damages for Injured Buggy and Horse--

Fire Chief Yoran Will Attend Firemen's Convention

The city council met in regular session last night and transacted the usual amount of business.

Street Commissioner Turner reported that 11,734 feet of lumber had been used during the last month.

Street committee reported that improvement of Walnut street, Sixth street and Fairmount boulevard had been accepted. Contract for grading Garden street lot to R. S. McCullough at 19 cents per yard, graveling same at 30 cents per yard. Alley between Alder and Patterson streets grading 25 cents per yard, graveling 72 cents per yard, let to Robt. McCullough. High street bids rejected as being too high.

The city attorney was ordered to purchase two acres of ground from A. K. Patterson, across the river, for a garbage ground. The price to be paid is \$200.

Petition that city pay for sprinkling streets in business portion referred.

Petition of J. W. Martin and others to vacate alley running north and south between Olive and Willamette streets from Fifth to depot grounds referred.

Petition for removal of junk shop at East Seventh and Olive streets granted.

Fire Chief Yoran was granted a 10-days' leave of absence. He will attend the annual convention of the Pacific Coast Fire Chiefs' Association at Calgary, Alberta, August 28. He was allowed \$50 for expenses.

Alton Hampton filed a claim for damages in the sum of \$200, incurred by his horse and buggy being damaged in a runaway on East Eleventh street recently. The buggy was overturned by running into a sewer ditch, causing the horse to become frightened and run away. Referred to city attorney.

Bids for sewer in alley between West Fourth and West Fifth streets, from the Jefferson street sewer running west 748 feet opened as follows: Mummay Bros., \$775; Thos. Soleim, \$681.16. Mr. Soleim was awarded the contract.

An adjourned meeting will be held next Monday night.

SHERIFF BRINGS BACK FORGER DAVIS

Returned Today From Lewiston, Idaho, Where His Man Had Been Arrested--Examination Will Be Held Tomorrow

It is alleged that Davis, who is a mere youth, forged a check for \$75, drawn on Jos. Doran, and forged Mrs. Agnes Doran's endorsement to it. He was accompanied back to Eugene by his mother who will employ attorneys to defend him.

Davis was lodged in the county jail and will have his preliminary examination before Justice of the Peace Bryson tomorrow.
