FROM EUGENE SOLDIERS AT CAMP TACOMA

Made the Trip From This City Without Mishap and Are Down to Regular Work—Several Former Eugene People in Other Oregon Companies

Camp Tacoma, Murray, Wash., Aug. 13.—The trip of the Eugene troops to American Lake was made without anything unusual happening. The men all had plenty to eat on the journey and no complaints were heard on that score. The third and last section to leave Portland consisted, besides Companies "A" and "C" from Eugene, of Co. "G," Third Regiment of Albany, Co. "M," Third Regiment of Salem, Co. "L," Third Regiment of Woodburn, Co. "D," Third Regiment of The Dalles, and left Portland about 11:35, giving no chance for the men to go up town, arriving at Lake View at about 5 o'clock, a station a few miles south of Tacoma, where we unloaded two years ago. We were held there until about 7 o'clock on account of a freight wreck near Murray station, arriving at the latter place just after dusk and marched to camp about one mile distance where the company made bivouac camp for the night in the company street.

The company's ranks were somewhat depleted and the spirit of the men quite depressed by a slight epidemic which was finally got under control the next morning. By the kind sympathy of Capt. Hammond, the careful amateur medical attention of First Sergeant Coppernoll, and the encouragement of Quarter Master Sergeant Huntley spirits are reviving and the boys who despaired of life Saturday night are now bright with the prospects of recovery.

Sunday morning we pitched the tents and the men made themselves comfortable in a short time. No field exercises today, but prospects of U. S. pay.

Tuesday morning the field exercises consist of a march approximately twelve miles. The march will be made as if operating in an enemy's country, with advance and flanking columns. One hour and a half stop at midday. On the return rear guard, representing a large body of troops in retreat, will be executed.

Thursday, August 16, the Second Brigade, to which the First Separate Battalion is assigned, march to a place near Stellacoom, and establish a bivouac by 5 p. m. with outposts, the march supposed to be conducted as through a friendly country.

Friday, August 17, the Browns will be entrenched near Tacoma, its base, having outposts extending to American Lake, the Blue force, supposed to occupy Olympia, making preparations for the offensive on Tacoma. In the advance on the morning of the 17th the armies will act as in the presence of the enemy in time of war.

Companies A and C have streets adjoining each other, with Captain Williams' company on the right of the battalion.

First Lieutenant Geo. Willoughby, of Co. C, has been attached to Co. A during camp, as neither of the lieutenants of Co. A were able to attend camp this year.

Sergeant Nathan Barrett, of Co. C, is acting sergeant major of the battalion.

Private Irving Wold is on special detail as orderly with Maj. Geo. O. Coran.

Routine work is assuming normal conditions and the men are entering into the pleasures and troubles of soldier life.

There are many reunions of Second Oregon men, Exposition Guards and veteran Guardsmen.

Chaplain W. S. Gilbert is in camp. Harry Holden is with a Portland company.

Glen Farrow joined Co. C at Lake View.

Dick Lombard is with The Dalles company, of which Arthur Stubling is quartermaster sergeant.

BEST APPLE CROP IN HISTORY OF COUNTY.

County Fruit Inspector H. F. McCormack is of the opinion that the apple crop in Lane county this year will be the largest ever gathered. He says that in the orchards which have been sprayed the fruit pests are conspicuous by their absence and the apples are the finest he ever saw, but in orchards where no spraying has been done the fruit is wormy and in most instances is entirely unmarketable. Apples, pears and plums are also very plentiful but the peach crop, on account of the cold snap in March, is practically a complete failure.

WORK PROGRESSING AT WALDO LAKE

D. Black, who with his father, A. R. Black, the well-known irrigation promoter, has been at Waldo Lake during the summer doing preliminary work for the big irrigation scheme planned for the upper Willamette valley, arrived in Eugene yesterday, accompanied by Civil Engineer Simon Klordehl.

To a Guard reporter last evening Mr. Black stated that considerable work has been done in the vicinity of the lake this summer. A good trail has been built from the military road to the lake, buildings for the men have been put up, new soundings of the water in the lake have been taken and considerable more data has been secured.
