Portland Papers Silent

It is up to the Portland papers to give to the latest analysis of Eugene's water supply the same prominence that they gave to the more unsatisfactory tests. Neither the Telegram nor the Journal had a word to say about it yesterday, although they were informed of the report made by the state bacteriologist. Justice is hardly exacted of the Oregonian, because that paper has never treated Eugene fairly, apparently holding a long-standing grudge against this city for some reason, but it was hoped that the Journal at least would not hesitate to give publicity to a matter of news so important to all who are interested in the welfare of Eugene.

The Commercial Club held a meeting last night, after the report on the analysis of the water samples was published in the Daily Guard, and took prompt and commendable action. It was decided to have the report widely advertised in the newspapers of the state, and to give it publicity in every other manner possible.

In Illinois after a hard tussle for its enactment, the new direct primary law went into effect recently with success. That veteran Republican, newspaper the Tribune, says: "It cost \$5,000 to get the new law, as those who have found fault with it have often remarked. It is worth all it cost. It has given honest primaries, each party keeping out of those of the other where, as in some congressional and senatorial districts, there were heated contests and much popular interest. The voters who went to the primaries were enabled to give the delegates binding and decisive instructions. The law gave the voters an opportunity to express their sentiments as to the choice of a senator. Of the 600,000 Republicans who voted for Deneen in 1904 over 250,000 have done so. The law will do more for the people than it will for the 'bosses' if the voters will use the rights the law gives them. The vote for United States senator which serves to re-elect Cullom destroyed the political prospects of the former Governor Richard Yates."

This news item from the Albany Democrat is interesting:
Hon. F. J. Miller is preparing to make a trip to the southern part of the county for the investigation of the boundary line, where Lane county a few years ago secured Mabel precinct, a fine body of land which should be a part of this county, and an effort will probably be made in the next legislature to secure its return.

But Lane county can't have Mabel. She's ours now and we are going to keep her.

It ought not to be possible for such bank frauds to occur in Chicago as are disclosed in the failure of the Milwaukee Avenue State Bank. Due

vigilance in examining the accounts and assets must have revealed the plunder that was in progress. Now that the concern has collapsed and the president has fled the inner doings of the bank are coming to light. It is discovered that the president had on hand blank notes on which persons' names had been traced. These were to be used in preparing forged notes. There are some strong state concerns in Chicago such as the Illinois Trust & Savings Bank, but the possibility of the Milwaukee Avenue fraud should lead to radical changes in the state system. The failure is not as great as that of the Welsh banks in the same city, but it discloses depravity of the worst kind, and effects a class of people who have in many cases lost the savings of a life time. No system, state or national, provides absolutely security.

Says the Eugene Guard in an interesting review of some of the railroad projects now under way in Western Oregon:

The building of the Coos Bay line seems to us to mark the beginning of an era of railroad building and commercial development that will transform Western Oregon into one of the most populous and prosperous sections of the United States. Any time we may expect to hear of the letting of contracts for the Naton-Ontario Klamath road, which will more directly affect the Willamette valley and Eugene, where it will connect up with the city and suburban system soon to be built by the Willamette Valley Co. With all these increasing facilities for transportation and a reasonable prospect that the Oregon Coast may be able to consummate its plans of building across Lane county to the Siuslaw and down the coast, the influx of population and increase in business will be almost incalculable during the next five years.

The Guard has its eye open. These things may be delayed a little while, but they are tolerably sure to come soon.

And the conclusion to which the Guard arrives is correct. The Journal has frequently stated substantially the same thing.
The "new era" that we prophesied is bulging, blooming. All the towns from Portland to Ashland, will be "in it"—none of them more than Eugene.

Let's all "shake"—and then put our paws to work.

By Jones Very



POSSIBLY the foremost of our American sonneters has been Jones Very (born at Salem, Mass., in 1813; died there in 1880). Very was graduated from Harvard in 1836 and taught Greek in the college for two years. In 1843 he was licensed to preach, but he was never ordained. He was a Unitarian in belief and a transcendentalist and mystic. "Jones Very has always pined the sad, sweet notes of religious melancholy," says one critic.
