SUPERINTENDENT FIELDS INSPECTS GRAVEL WORK

Says 50 Miles of Track Will Be Ballasted and Raised by Time River Gets Too High to Operate Pitt--Couldn't Say When New Eugene Depot Will Be Built

L. R. Fields, superintendent of the Southern Pacific railroad lines in Oregon, is in Eugene, having arrived this morning in his private car, "California." To a reporter he stated this afternoon that he was here to look after the work of taking out the gravel at the new pits across the river in addition to his regular inspection work. He expressed himself as being well pleased with the progress of operations over the river and stated that the work of rebalasting the main line and raising the track from Divide north was going on rapidly. He expects that about 50 out of the 85 miles of track to be thus improved will be completed by the time the river becomes too high next winter to prevent the work of taking out the gravel.

Asked as to when the new depot for Eugene is to be built and when the yards here are to be rearranged, Mr. Fields replied that he couldn't say; so much other work is on hand, he said, that the work here will have to take its turn and it is hard to tell when it will begin.

Mr. Fields goes to Roseburg tomorrow morning and will be back to Eugene the next day.

CAR SHORTAGE SERIOUS FOR BOOTH-KELLY CO.

All Sawmills in the Interior Will Have to Close Down

Night Shift at Booth-Kelly Plants Will Be Taken Off This Week and Only Question of Time Until Mills Will Be Idle--Few Cars Last Night

Unless the car shortage on the Southern Pacific railroad is relieved immediately all interior sawmills in the state will be compelled to cease business. Such was a statement made by R. A. Booth, manager of the Booth-Kelly Lumber Co., to a Guard reporter today.

Every year there is a shortage of cars for the transportation of lumber, but this year, on account of the San Francisco disaster, it is far worse than ever before and unless the situation is relieved within a very short time, Manager Booth says, his company will be compelled to close down their big mills in this county. This week the night shift at the Coburg and Springfield mills will be taken off and only a day shift run, as at Wendling and Saginaw. It will be only a matter of a few days until all of these plants will be idle unless the railroad company does something at once to increase the number of cars now being delivered to haul away the lumber. Twenty-one cars were received at the several mills last night, but most of these were for hauling the railroad company's own orders. For several days past the average number of cars received has been much less than that and the Booth-Kelly people were surprised to receive as many as they did last night.

The Booth-Kelly Co. does its business entirely on the order system, and when the orders cannot be delivered at the time specified they are cancelled and the lumber buyer places his order with some company that can make the delivery. It is for this reason that the company will have to close down its mills, and it is the same way will all other interior mills at Portland and Columbia river points, where there are competing railroads and ocean going vessels to haul away the lumber, it is different, and unless conditions on the Southern Pacific are changed, the Portland and Columbia river mills will be practically the only ones in the state that will be able to operate.

SMALL MILLS SUFFER.

The smaller mills of Lane county will also suffer from the car shortage. F. C. Walters, of the Walters Lumber Co. at Elmira, was in the city today and stated that his mill would probably close down at once until such a time as cars are plentiful again. The company's yards in Eugene are full, but no cars can be obtained. They have been shipping a great deal of lumber to California points for several months past.

A GREAT BLOW.

The closing down of the Booth-Kelly mills is going to be a great blow to the prosperity of Eugene and Lane county. The company's payroll now exceeds \$100,000 a month. This money alone taken out of circulation will cause a big slump in business in all lines. Mr. Booth says his company has used its most endeavors to induce the railroad company to furnish more cars and prevent a closing down of the mills, but it now appears that the inevitable must come.

The Eastern and California stockholders in the company have been communicated with in regard to the advisability of closing down all the plants and a final decision was expected this afternoon, but the matter was postponed another day in hopes that the railroad company could give assurances that more cars would be furnished.

employe, on the other hand, to the strike. While both are to be deplored, considering the volume of production and the increase of population, they are becoming less frequent. In my judgment the time will come when all such differences will be settled amicably between the contending forces; but in all contests employer and employe alike must obey the law which governs and protects all. The boycott and the blacklist will pass away.

GOVERNMENT BY INJUNCTION.

"There has been much criticism and much denunciation against alleged 'government by injunction,' and violent attacks have been made upon the judiciary of the United States. During the late session of congress labor leaders differed as to the legislation that was desired. Mr. Gompers, professing to speak for the American Federation of Labor, denounced the so-called Puller bill, pending before the house committee on the judiciary and advocated by H. R. Fuller, the representative of the railway labor unions; in the most bitter terms as being opposed to human liberty and the rights of labor. Mr. Gompers, with Mr. Spelling, his attorney, advocated a bill, introduced by request by Representative Pearce and pending before the same committee, which, in substance, prohibited United States courts from issuing injunctions in any case between employer and employe unless necessary to prevent irreparable injury to property or to a property right of the party making the application, for which injury there is no adequate remedy at law, and in the next sentence provided, 'And for the purposes of this act no right to carry on business of any particular kind or at any particular place, or at all, shall be construed, held, considered, or treated as property, or as constituting a property right.' Mr. Spelling, speaking for Mr. Gompers and himself, claimed that such legislation ought to be enacted. It being near the end of the session, further consideration of the proposed legislation by the house judiciary committee was postponed until the next session of congress.

"Speaking for myself, I am not in favor of this legislation demanded by Mr. Gompers. The power of the courts to issue writs of injunction to prevent irreparable injury to property or to a property right, for which there is no adequate remedy at law is older than the constitution and as well established as any other principle of law or equity. The inalienable right of each citizen, be he weak or strong, is to come and go to and from his property without molestation, and to carry on business thereon, and, in the exercise of such right, he is entitled to call upon the government for protection through the courts.

"Mr. Gompers claims that in contests growing out of strikes or lock-outs he is opposed to violence on the part of any one connected with the controversy. I will not question the good faith of the claim, but I do say that if the legislation he demands were enacted destruction of property by irresponsible persons in such controversies would increase. Again, if such legislation were enacted, under its cover vicious and irresponsible people belonging to the criminal class, not engaged in labor or seeking to labor, would avail themselves of the opportunity, as they have in many instances, in the name of contesting labor, of destroying property, and the owners thereof would be without remedy. The legislation that Mr. Gompers demands would turn loose in times of trouble the criminally disposed. In charity for him, I do not believe that he realizes the consequences that would result from that which he advocates, and in justice to all the citizenship of the

republic, in justice to every man who lives in the sweat of his face by honest endeavor, I am now, and will be at all times, opposed to this legislation which he demands.

"For thirty years I have represented a district where nearly all the constituency have lived, and are living, by their labor. They and those like unto them stand for law and order, for protection of property, and the inalienable rights of every citizen. Those who labor have trod, and are treading, no paths that I have not trod, and that my descendants will not tread. The organized labor that Mr. Gompers claims to represent is composed of people who have the right to organize. They are of all shades and of no church; they are skilled and unskilled; they are as intelligent and as patriotic as any other equal number of citizens of the republic. In the transaction of the business of their organization I have no doubt but they will co-operate with those who form time to time their place in authority, but in their party affiliations, in choosing the policies of the republic, I am ready to take my chances with them and this, too, without regard to the demands of Mr. Gompers when he seeks to control their action at the ballot box."
