Portland, Or., Aug. 15.—There is a much firmer tone to the potato market owing to the smaller receipts of first-class stock. A large per cent of the stock dug during the hot weather shows bad keeping quality, and for first class potatoes the dealers with orders for immediate shipment are offering more money. As high as 85c is reported paid for first-class stock for this class of shipment. For local trade the highest price offered along the street is 75c, with a large per cent of the business being done at 70c per 100 pounds. Page & Son have received the contract for furnishing the government with 225,000 pounds of potatoes for Alaska shipment. These will be packed in crates.

SIX CARS NEW WHEAT ARRIVE.
Six cars of new wheat, the first to be received in this city this season, came in yesterday for the Portland Flouring Mills company.
The wheat market is quite steady in this city and in the interior, and some good sized purchases are reported. A large per cent of the new wheat already inspected is said to be shrivelled on account of the continued hot weather.
The flour market is rather quiet for export, with some offers of Japan and China around \$3.05. A few of these

orders have been accepted by smaller millers, but others are holding out for \$3.15, the former asking price here.
CREAMERY BUTTER TWO CENTS HIGHER.
Most of the city creameries today advanced their price of best butter to 25c, a rise of 2 cents a pound over yesterday's prices. A shortage in cream and some good-sized orders from the north, as well as improved local business, the cause.
Eggs are just holding their own, while poultry is firm for hens and large springs at the same price. Small springs hard to move.

PINCUS TO PAY MORE FOR HOPS
According to Julius Pincus, of Leachman & Pincus, of Salem, the hop market will be placed on an 18c basis today. Mr. Pincus says he has an option on about 300 bales of a west side grower at 18c a pound, which he will accept today. No other business is reported.

COUNTY BOUNDARY FIGHT ON AGAIN
The Journal correspondent at Albany writes: County Judge C. H. Stewart left today for the Calapooia mines. He will be joined by Senator M. A. Miller, of Lebanon, and Representative Brown, of Brownsville. The purpose of the journey is to look over the field together with a representation from Lane county and endeavor to arrive at a satisfactory settlement of the boundary dispute between Lane and Lane counties.
For years this has been a great bone of contention between the delegations from the respective counties and has become so of late years on account of the valuable mines discovered in the locality. During the last session of the legislature an effort was made to settle the question, but without avail.

It is thought by holding a conference over the matter while being on the grounds that possibly a satisfactory disposition can be made of the controversy. Some of the most valuable of the mines are located near the boundary line of the two counties and neither side is willing to forego their rights to the same without a contest.
