

SEWER SYSTEM AT SPRINGFIELD IMMEDIATELY

Council Decides to Build System
Extending in Alleys Back of
Business Streets — Professor
Roberts, of Montana, Engaged
as School Principal

At the regular meeting of the city council Monday evening it was decided to put in a sewer system at once. At present the mains will only be laid in the alleys between Main and North A and Main and South A. The street committee was instructed to engage a surveyor at once and get estimates on the cost of the work.

CEMENT WALK ORDINANCE TALKED OF

City Council May Compel Property
Owners to Build Sidewalks of
Cement Within Certain Boundaries — Albany Has Such a
Law

Members of the city council are discussing the matter of passing an ordinance compelling the laying of cement sidewalks within certain boundaries to be fixed by the ordinance. The sidewalks in the business district are nearly all of cement, but it is desired to extend the cement district out into some of the residence portions of the city.

It has been suggested that the cement district include Willamette street from the depot to Eleventh street, East Eleventh street from Willamette to the university, and Fifth, Sixth, Seventh, Eighth, Ninth and Tenth several blocks in each direction from Willamette street.

Albany has such an ordinance and the district extends seven or eight blocks out from the main business street. That city has a great many more feet of cement sidewalk than Eugene, and the citizens point with pride to their splendid appearance.
