NEWS FROM THE SOLDIER LADS AT CAMP TACOMA

Off on a Two-Days' "Hike," Taking Shelter Tents and Blankets. Reunion of Lewis and Clark Fair Guards—Government Pay Received

Camp Tacoma, Aug. 16.—Today we go on the big "hike," taking our shelter tents and blankets and will be gone the most of two days, leaving at 8:30 in the morning. The boys will carry rations.

Tuesday night about fifty of the Lewis and Clark Guards made the rounds of the camp and carrying their old cook, "George," on their shoulders, congregated in Company A's street, held a reunion with songs and speeches. They appointed Quartermaster Sergeant Huntley, of Co. A, chairman of a committee composed of Cook Marshall, of C, and Sergeant Morelock, of C, Third regiment, with full power to act and prepare a banquet, to be attended by all members of the Centennial Guards present. Sergeant Huntley acted as chairman of the meeting and the boys had a jolly time before dispersing. Members of the Guard from Eugene are William Crabtree, of Hospital Corps; Quartermaster Sergeant M. B. Huntley, Corporal R. S. Huston, Privates Pres. Ham and Walter Baker, of Co. A; First Sergeant Wm. Gilbert, Sergeant Kerr, Corporal Glenn Farrow, Corporal Walter Stafford and Cook Dock Marshall, of Co. C. Captain Hammond, of Co. A, was also a member of the Centennial Guards.

The boys are all having a good time and Co. A can have no complaint to make about food.

Some of the married men who have been compelled to wash articles of their apparel say they can now appreciate their wives upon returning, conspicuous among these being a jeweler and a barber of Eugene.

Claud Adkins is considered the ladies' man of Co. A.

Night Watchman Purdy, desiring to have a friendly visit with the Tacoma officers of law, went to town with that as an object, but hunted until 11:30 p. m. without finding one.

The first separate battalion was made happy with their government pay today. For ten days the pay is as follows: First sergeants, \$8.33; sergeants, \$6; corporals, \$5; cooks, \$6; privates, \$4.33. The balance of their pay is from the state. Service pay is also allowed at this camp at the rate of 25 cents per day for three years' service; 50 cents for over six years; 75 cents for over 11 years and \$1 for over sixteen years.

A crow passed over the camp today carrying a caution and haversack, and close observers claim that the reason of this equipment was to prevent starvation while traveling over this barren country.

Mention of the service of Corporal Charles Evans, of Co. C, during the illness of the members of Company A the first night was overlooked in our last letter. Corporal Evans is of a very sympathetic nature and the members of Co. A appreciate it. If the epidemic had been of a contagious nature his service would not only have been a great kindness, but heroic.

Earl Small arrived in camp with the Idaho National Guards from Nampa and joined Company A last Monday night.

The next two days may put the boys all to a severe test of endurance, so they are all retiring early. H.

BAD FIRE AT KLAMATH FALLS

A press dispatch from Klamath Falls yesterday says:

At 9:45 a. m. yesterday morning the explosion of a gasoline generator in the Klamath Falls steam laundry set fire to the building and contents. The fire spread rapidly to adjacent buildings. The laundry owned by B. D. Campbell and W. O. Smith, the Klamath Falls Marble Works, owned by Grizzle Bros, together with their dwelling, also the dwelling owned by Mrs. Plater were entirely consumed. Two other cottages, a blacksmith shop and a stable were somewhat damaged. Repeated explosions of gasoline and of ammunition kept in the building added to the danger of those who fought the fire. Two men were knocked down and run over by a hosecart and considerably injured. The loss entailed will probably reach \$10,000.

MILLION FEET OF LUMBER DESTROYED

Fire at D. W. Huffer's Sawmill Above Cottage Grove Causes Big Loss. Thought to Have Originated From Smoldering Yellow Jacket's Nest

Cottage Grove, Aug. 18.—Word reached here this morning that on Wednesday night fire destroyed the lumber yard at the mill of D. W. Huffer, located near Divide, five miles south of this city. The loss aggregates 1,000,000 feet of good, clear and dressed lumber, which was worth, on an average, \$14 per thousand feet, hence the loss falls quite heavily on Mr. Huffer. No insurance.

The fire is thought to have originated from a smoldering yellow-jacket's nest which was burned out during the previous day in order to destroy the little pests, which annoyed the yard men, but it was thought the fire in the nest was entirely extinguished before the men quit work in the evening.

HUGE SMOKESTACK SHIPPED TO DALLAS

The huge smokestack formerly at the Lane County Electric Company's old plant on East Eighth street has been purchased by the Willamette Valley Co. and was today shipped to Dallas where the company is erecting a fine new electric plant. The stack is 100 feet long and 50 inches in diameter, said to be the second largest ever sold in Oregon.
