OREGON BOYS REMAIN TWO DAYS LONGER

General Funston Desired That They
Remain in Camp and They Will
Not Start Home Till Wednesday.
First Separate Battalion Engaged
in the Big Battle

(Special correspondence.)

Camp Tacoma, Murray, Wash., Aug. 18.—The First Separate Battalion returned yesterday about 1 p. m. from the two days' exercise in good condition. We left camp Thursday at 8 o'clock a. m., marching to Roy, on the Portland-Tacoma railroad line, and made a bivouac camp with our shelter tents, arriving there at 2 o'clock p. m. At 4 o'clock sounded, mess call at 4:30, and at 5 o'clock our column, a brigade composed of the Twenty-second Infantry, Hawthorne's battery and the First Separate Battalion, O. N. G., Colonel Reynolds commanding, started toward the enemy. Our scouts struck the enemy about 10 o'clock and soon after the batteries wheeled into action and be-

march whenever the column stopped. The young boys who accompanied the Eugene companies are all enjoying themselves and are well. They are Major Yoran's son, Francis, Captain Williams' son and Policeman Purdy's son.

gan to fire, then the work of the infantry commenced. The First Separate Battalion went on the line in double time and advanced by rushes, driving a battery and the troops in front of us back. Recall was sounded at about 11:30, and the opposing forces assembled and took up march to their respective camps.

During the movement the men who have been under fire seemed to scent the excitement of battle at a distance and enter into the action with a spirit that brought back memories of the past.

The men will now be given a rest until Monday, with the exception of inspection under light marching order at 9:30 Saturday morning.

The Oregon troops were scheduled to return Monday, but now it is certain our time will be extended two days longer and we will break camp Wednesday morning. General Funston sent an inquiry to company commander to find the sentiment of the men, but no definite opinion was gained, though we understand that General Funston desires the extension and it will be ordered.

Half of the company is in Tacoma on a pass and the other half can go today after inspection and remain until Sunday morning.
