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### TWO BARNS AT TRENT BURNED

#### Henry Godard Is Heavy Loser— Fire Spread Over a Field, Destroying Hay

Two barns belonging to Henry Godard at Trent were burned yesterday evening about five o'clock, together with a lot of hay and grain. Mr. Godard's three-year-old son was playing about one of the barns and struck a match, letting it fall on some loose hay. No one else was there at the time and within a moment the whole barn was a mass of flames. The fire spread to the other barn and to a neat by field. The wind carried it rapidly over a considerable stretch of territory and it took the combined efforts of quite a number of men to extinguish it. About 25 tons of hay and 450 bushels of oats

in the barns and a large amount of hay in the field were destroyed. The loss is probably \$1000.

# ASK FOR INTERURBAN TRAIN SERVICE

## Merchants' Protective Association Makes Move for Better Transportation

### Passed Resolution Asking Southern Pacific to Put On Several Passenger Trains Between Eugene and Wendling and Natron After Springfield Bridge is Completed

At last night's regular meeting of the Merchants' Protective Association the matter of better transportation facilities for Eugene was thoroughly discussed with the result that a resolution was unanimously adopted asking the Southern Pacific Company to establish a regular and frequent train service, after the Springfield bridge is completed, between this city and Wendling and Natron. The proposition is fully explained in the following, which was presented by M. S. Barker, and a copy of which will at once be sent to the railroad officials at Portland:

"Owing to the fact that the immense storehouses of Eugene being crowded with the latest creations in modern merchandise and modern goods of every known description and the fact that Eugene is now recognized as the greatest marketing and merchandising point in Central Western Oregon, and as people go to very much trouble to reach this market,

senger train on the East Side road, leaving Woodburn at 6 or 7 o'clock in the morning and coming through Co-burg and Springfield, reach Eugene at 9 or 10 o'clock in the morning. On its down trip it could leave at 4 or 5 o'clock in the afternoon over the same route. This train would serve a vast number of people who now have poor train service and would put them in touch with Eugene, one of the best supply points in the state.

"The Eugene merchants will do all they can to have the above mentioned train service patronized by way of offering attractive prices on good merchandise, and we think that there is no doubt that these trains will prove profitable to the company."

as for instance by team 30 to 50 miles, paralleling the railroad on account of the railroad having no train service on this particular line, this is doing the merchants of Eugene, as well as the people who trade at Eugene, an injustice.

"The merchants of Eugene are by every honorable means trying to build up trade and to make this city a good live commercial city, and they believe with the co-operation of the Southern Pacific Co. much good can be done to both parties interested. The Southern Pacific Co. will remember that when we petitioned for an extension of the Albany local to Eugene it was done with some misgivings, but it has turned out well for the company and for Eugene. Now if you will give us what we are about to ask for we think it will pay you well, give good accommodations to along suffering public and make the merchants of Eugene happy as well as put dollars in their pockets. And dollars in their pockets means more dollars to your company, as all merchants ship more goods with their new dollars. Now what we want and would like to have very much is, just as soon as the Springfield bridge is completed, a passenger train with the following schedule:

"Leave Eugene for Wendling at 7 a. m. each morning; leave Wendling for Eugene at 8:20 a. m. Leave Eugene for Natron at 9:30 a. m.; leave Natron for Eugene at 10 a. m. Leave Eugene for Wendling at 10:30 a. m.; leave Wendling for Eugene at 12:0 a. m. Leave Eugene for Natron at 1:30 p. m.; leave Natron for Eugene at 2 p. m. Leave Eugene for Wendling at 2:30 p. m.; leave Wendling for Eugene at 3:30 p. m., arriving in Eugene at 4:30 p. m. and remain over night till 7 o'clock in the morning. This would make a run for this train of about 164 miles and it would be well patronized. The schedule outlined above is merely a suggestion and you could best arrange it to suit yourselves, but what we want is a better train service.

"At the present time there are two stage lines and one automobile line operating between Eugene and Springfield to accommodate the passenger traffic between the two points and they are very busy.

# TO HARNESS THE WATERS OF HORSE CREEK

## S. W. Curtis, of San Francisco, Said to Represent An Eastern Aluminum Manufacturing Concern, Files on Power Site Near Foley Springs

S. W. Curtis, of San Francisco, this morning filed with County Clerk Lee a notice of a water right location on Horse Creek, the stream on which the Foley Springs are located. The notice states that 20,000 miners' inches, under a six inch pressure, of the waters of the north fork of Horse Creek are appropriated, the water being in volume a continuous flow of 500 cubic feet per second. The water is appropriated for the purpose of developing the mineral resources of the state of Oregon and to furnish electrical power and energy for light, heat and other purposes. The canal, to be known as the Warren canal, will be 15 feet wide on the bottom and six feet deep.

The point of diversion is on the south bank of the stream at or near the head of the Horse creek falls. The whole length of the canal will be in the Cascade forest reserve and the general course will be in a southwesterly direction. It will be three miles in length, discharging near the mouth of the south fork of the creek. Two reservoirs are planned, one near the in ake and will consist of a dam 50 feet high, to be extended across the creek. The other will be located hereafter at a point deemed advisable or convenient.

Mr. Curtis and his wife, who have been enjoying an outing at Foley Springs, arrived in Eugene on last night's stage and left for San Francisco this afternoon. Mr. Curtis, when seen by a Guard reporter this morning, declined to make a statement concerning his new water right but it is understood he is a representative of the Pittsburg Reduction Co., of Niagara Falls, manufacturers of aluminum. It may be possible that within the next few years an aluminum plant will be built in Eugene and the electric power to operate it furnished from the site just filed on by Mr. Curtis.
