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CHAS. H. CHICK SUES EX-REGISTER BRIDGES

For Performance of Contract
to Sell McKenzie Timber
Lands

Agreed to Convey to Chick and
His Associates 720 Acres for
\$14,400, But Repudiated Con-
tract--Suits Against Others May
Soon Be Instituted

Chas. H. Chick, who with his associates, Constantine Morton and Everett P. Lewis, of Grand Rapids, Mich., has been buying considerable timber land up the McKenzie river for some time past, today instituted a suit in the circuit court of Lane county against J. T. Bridges, former register of the United States land office at Roseburg, to force the performance of a contract for the sale of 720 acres of timber land lying in township 17 south of range four east, in the upper McKenzie country.

Mr. Chick alleges in his complaint that on August 14, 1906, an agreement was entered into whereby the defendant, in consideration of \$20 per acre, or a total sum of \$14,400, to be paid by the plaintiff, agreed to convey unto the plaintiff and Constantine Morton and Everett P. Lewis within ten days from the date of the contract, the land above mentioned. He alleges that he has deposited with the First National Bank of Eugene the purchase price agreed upon, but that Bridges has refused to carry out his part of the agreement, viz.: to furnish abstract of title to the land and deliver a warranty deed; that he has wholly repudiated the agreement and refused to proceed in any manner in the carrying out of the agreement and has so notified the plaintiff.

Mr. Chick prays for a decree directing and requiring the defendant to perform his part of the contract and that the defendant be required to convey said lands with abstract of title, as provided and required in the contract, with a sufficient warranty deed.

It is said that quite a number of other people owning timber lands in the vicinity of the Bridges' tract who have made contracts to sell to Chick, Morton and Lewis, have repudiated them and that suit against them will also be commenced.

Mr. Chick's counsel in this case is Lark Bilyeu.

J. D. MATLOCK'S THREE-STORY ADDITION

Plans Now Being Drawn and Work
on Building Is Expected to Be-
gin Next Month--Will Be 30x50
Feet in Dimensions and Cost
About \$5000

J. D. Matlock is having the plans drawn for the new three-story brick addition to his block at the corner of Eighth and Willamette streets, mentioned exclusively by the Guard a few days ago. John Hunzicker is the architect.

The addition will be 30x50 feet in dimensions, extending from the old building west to the alley. The ground floor will be divided into two business rooms facing on West Eighth street, with modern plate glass fronts. The second and third floors will be divided into 17 lodging rooms and will be connected by hallways with the old building, where a lodging house is now conducted. The present stairway will be used for the new addition. The cost of construction will be in the neighborhood of \$5000. Mr. Matlock says work on the addition will probably begin next month, and it will be completed early next year. The exterior of the entire structure, 30x100 feet, will be cemented.

MIDNIGHT BLAZE DESTROYS SHOP

A. L. Smitherman Loses Blacksmith
and Wagon Shop With All Its
Contents--Loss About Six Hun-
dreds Dollars

A small blacksmith and carriage shop belonging to Allen L. Smitherman and located on ground owned by C. M. Elspass on Ferry street near the river bridge was completely destroyed by fire between 11:30 and 12 o'clock last night. The contents were also burned. The owner estimates his loss at \$600, with no insurance.

The origin of the fire is not known, but Mr. Smitherman believes some one started it maliciously. It was first discovered by Lester Newman, who lives with his parents just across

the street from the shop. The light of the flames awakened him and he aroused his folks and telephoned in the alarm. The chemical engine arrived at the scene of the fire a few minutes after the alarm had been sounded, but as the building had fallen in the machine was not put to use. The hose carts and hook and ladder truck did not get there. The building was erected only a short time ago at a cost of about \$100. There were about \$500 worth of tools and stock in the building. Mr. Smitherman says he will rebuild as soon as possible.
