FOREPAUGH-SELLS BIG CIRCUS IN EUGENE

Only One Performance Given Owing to Big Jump to Medford---All Eugene and Surrounding Country Attended and Filled the Big Tent

Early this morning the great Forepaugh and Sells Brothers united shows, a city in themselves, descended upon Eugene, and from the time the first of the four trains bringing the show stopped the small boy and the wise merchant were busy studying the vast intricate system of the shows.

At ten o'clock, as advertised, the great parade moved through Eugene's principal streets. Punctuality is a part of show life, and the great Forepaugh shows never wait till the next minute when the schedule to do a given thing at a certain time.

Though the circus gave only one show in Eugene this does not imply that Eugene is too small for two shows or that the circus slighted the city. The next town where the Adam Forepaugh-Sells Brothers stops is at Medford. The jump from here to Medford is such a long one that the show had to start early and take plenty of time to make the run.

The small boy—behind whose enthusiasm many hide their desire to see the show—was in evidence early in the day. He put in a hard day of it. He did not miss anything from the flat cars to the big show itself. And tonight when he goes home it will be to sleep the sleep of the just because he has been on his good behavior for a full month in anticipation of seeing the world of wonders.

The circus itself is a marvel. The novelties and feats of daring introduced in the big show tent are far too numerous to mention. At times fifteen big acts, every one of which is worthy of the price of admission, are going in the three rings and on the two stages.

In the middle of the big tent is a street scene, such as one will see in a metropolitan theatre. While the crowd is going its rounds in the street the hotel in the centre of the scene is fired by an explosion. The fire department of four companies respond to the alarm. Ladders of the hotel are taken from the windows with life lines. Others jump into life nets, and on the whole the scene is so realistic that the observers for a time forget it is a spectacle rather than a reality.

Salvo's leap to the moon is another striking feature of the show. The rider shoots down an incline of 45 degrees. When his wheel hits the bottom he is shot high in the air to catch on a moon shaped net at the tent top. His deed of daring is applauded to the echo.

At the show this afternoon all Eugene and the surrounding country passed into the big tent. It was filled to capacity, and none of the thousands turned away to say other than that what has been said of the show was true in detail.

NOTES OF THE CIRCUS.

In the parade were 230 horses, 16 elephants, 12 camels, 5 lions, 3 tigers, 2 brown bears, 2 polar bears, 3 bands, a fire department, performers, closed wagons, etc.

Numerous lemonade and lunch stands were conducted during the day.

Four coach loads of people came in from Cottage Grove and points between here and there on this morning's local.

The usual number of fakirs, not attached to the show, "did" the people about town.

Chief of Police Farrington has no extra policemen on duty today. Street Commissioner Turner and Assistant Baker doing duty. The crowd is orderly and no drunks are noticed.

The blind couple who make a business of following circuses and who are said to be worth thousands of dollars, attracted crowds on the street with their music (?) and picked up good money.

There appears to be a larger crowd in town than at the time Harnum & Bailey's show appeared here last year.

E. T. Condon, of the University bakery, furnished 1200 loaves of bread for the circus and 1800 loaves for the local trade. He also supplied 100 gallons of milk for the city.
