FLORENCE WILL CONTINUE HIGH SCHOOL

Special Election Held to Determine the Matter—Miss Gertrude Hamble Elected Principal of School. General Items of Interest to Siuslaw People

A special meeting of the electors of Florence school district was held at the school house last Friday afternoon, the object being to take a vote on the question of continuing the ninth and tenth grades in the school. The vote was taken by ballot, the polls being kept open from 2 o'clock till 4, the school directors and clerk acting as the election board.

Quite a number of the men were busy and rather a light vote was cast. When the ballots were counted it was found the vote was almost unanimous in favor of continuing the high school, there being 18 votes for and only 3 against it.

TEACHERS ELECTED.

A meeting of the school board was held Saturday evening at which Miss Gertrude Hamble, of Eugene, was elected principal.

Miss Gertrude Schreuders, who taught the primary department last year, will have charge of that room again this coming year.

Miss Hamble taught in the Eugene schools last year and at present is teaching at Leaburg in this county. She comes highly recommended as a teacher.

NOTES.

The railroad surveyors, who have been working near Hecla lighthouse for about two weeks, have located a line for some distance south from Cape Creek and will reach the level country below the cape ridge in a few days more, they will then be able to make more rapid progress.

County Judge Chrisman and Commissioner Price arrived here Saturday on a trip over the roads in the west part of the county. They went over to Fiddle creek and up North Fork and returned to the valley by the way of Lake creek.

The fishermen are getting their boats and nets ready for the season's fishing and several of them have already begun to capture the finny beauties.

The schooners Oakland and Wash-calore are loaded with lumber at the Oregon & California Lumber Co.'s mill and waiting an opportunity to go to sea.

The Hord Lumber & Navigation Co. are building a warehouse on the wharf in front of their store. The building will be 30x65 feet.

The schooner Mayflower was towed down the river with a cargo of lumber yesterday afternoon.—Florence West.
