Society appointed to make an analysis on Eugene's city water:

The committee on investigation of the city water supply make the following report:

That on Tuesday, August 21, we collected samples of water from various places, well distributed over the city, and from the river water before it entered the filter, and from the washings of the filters, and tested the same. The only samples which developed culture were those taken from the river and from the washings of the filters, which were bacillus subtilis and pyrococcus. None of the samples taken from the mains developed cultures, thus showing that the filters are effective in this work and that practically speaking the mains are pretty thoroughly cleansed from contamination.

This does not necessarily prove that there is absolutely no contamination in any of the mains, but to all intents and purposes it would be impossible to get infection from the city water, and the remotest possibility becomes more remote each day as the supply of pure water running through the mains carries out all contamination.

We believe that the pressure to which the water is submitted in the filter tanks is in large measure responsible for the cleanliness of the water, a pressure of from 110 to 125 pounds being maintained at all times. The committee herewith supply a statement from the water company to the effect that no chemicals or other means than the filters are or have ever been used in purifying the water, and further the committee wishes to state that to the best of

their belief the city water is perfectly safe for drinking and all household purposes.

We hereby assure the committee of the Lane County Medical Society that there are no chemicals or disinfectants being used in the city water or ever have been used, the only method of purification used being the filters.
