THE LACK OF MOTIVE POWER IS BLAMED

To Such Is Due Present Car Shortage, Declares Well Informed Official—Railroads Do Not Keep Up Equipment—Increased Business Does Not Bring Locomotives

From good authority it is learned that the so-called car shortage in the Pacific Northwest is due to inadequate motive power equipment instead of scarcity of freight cars, says the Portland Journal. The Northern Pacific and Southern Pacific roads are said to be especially short of locomotives to handle their enormously increased business. The statement comes from a well informed source above question.

This authority said: "Engines are needed to switch cars and make up trains at way points, and other engines are imperatively needed to haul the trains through. The railroad companies are making enormous profits by forcing the transaction of an enormous volume of business with limited equipment. There has been a quadrupling of business and population without a similar increase of transportation facilities. The railroad companies do not comprehend the situation. They underestimate the real conditions."

"They are like the agent who is sent out to examine a section and report on its productivity to enable the officials to determine whether a railroad should be extended. The agent invariably makes an ultra-conservative report, cutting in half the volume of business the proposed railroad would be likely to get. It is a disease that afflicts the average man connected with an existing railroad in the West. He cannot credit himself to give the country credit for what it could do if it had the opportunity."

MOVEMENT IN PROGRESS.

"There is a movement in progress in the Pacific Northwest that is bringing results in rapidly increasing business. The first thing to follow increased business is need of more trains over the railroads, and the trains have to be hauled by locomotives. Most of the new engines bought have simply taken the places of old engines sold or sent to the junk pile."

"The railroad companies do not realize that they are killing the goose that is laying the golden egg by their policy of suppressing industry. Men who have saved up a few thousand dollars and invested in little sawmill industries along the railway lines are being ruined by the car troubles. The larger firms in lumber and various lines manage to worry along, but they are handicapped. The car shortage could be almost instantly eliminated if the railroad companies had adequate motive power equipment."

CONVENTION TO BE HELD IN SPOKANE

Spokane, Wash., Aug. 25.—Editor of the Guard.—As a result of extended conferences held at Portland and Spokane, under the auspices of the executive committee of the Portland Commercial Club and the publicity committee of the Spokane Chamber of Commerce, it was unanimously decided to hold a convention at Spokane and invite the co-operation of every commercial and industrial body in the states of Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana to participate through representative delegations.

The purpose of this gathering is to bring together the representative men of this most prosperous section of the United States, and after thorough consultation unite upon a plan to advertise the actual resources and not to exploit the peculiar advantages of any of the cities.

In all this vast empire the greatest resource is timber, the principal cereal is wheat, the chief fruit the apple, the greatest force waterpower, and the most necessary development increased irrigation, while mining and stock-raising are equally important.

Every city and town in the four states is equally interested in securing the homebuilder, for it is only through increased population that we can develop these tremendous resources which are of necessity the foundation upon which our cities must be permanently prosperous.

The officers and active members of the leading commercial organizations in the Pacific Northwest have discussed this meeting and have promised to be present personally. The lowest possible railroad rates will be made, and the work of this convention will be watched with interest by the passenger and immigration officials of all transcontinental railroads, among whom there is a universal disposition throughout all this section of the United States to have its resources advertised—its busiest and best men are ready to put up their money and give their time.

It is expected the legislatures of all four interested states may be induced to make appropriations for advertising their own peculiar advantages, and the lawmakers of the four states will be very much interested in the deliberations of this convention, and for that reason all delegates are urged to ascertain the sentiment in their immediate communities before coming to the convention.

We are anxious that your locality should be represented, and this call will be taken as a personal appeal by every community it reaches.
