HOME FROM THE NEW GOLD FIELDS NEAR LAKEVIEW

M. S. Hubble Brings Some Very Rich Ore With Him—Will Return and Take Up a Claim. Big Rush of Prospectors From Lakeview

M. S. Hubble, who returned Sunday evening from a trip to Paisley and Lakeview, in Lake county, brought with him a few samples of ore from the new gold mine discovery in the Coyote hills. In one or two of the samples gold can be seen with the naked eye and assays show that the rock from which they were taken will yield \$800 to the ton. Mr. Hubble expects to return to that country soon and will take up a claim in the gold district.

DISCOVERED IN MAY.

E. H. Loftus, formerly a stockman of Lake county, but of late years a resident of the oil fields of California, arrived at Lakeview in May of this year and with his brother, J. W. Loftus, began prospecting for gold in the Coyote hills, on the edge of the desert, about 30 miles northwest of Lakeview on a straight line. About a week ago they came into town with some very rich rock in small pieces which run very high with free gold. Assays estimated that the rock would run from \$200 to \$5000 per ton.

From this the rush began. Every available team and vehicle in Lakeview was brought into service to convey the gold fever patients to the new strike. Some went a long way around, arriving there after dark, and did not take time to eat a bite, but hobbled their horses and struck out to locate claims by moonlight, working all night staking off claims without any knowledge of locality, ledges or anything else.

The Loftus brothers had staked off about 20 claims, but it was alleged that they had not found the ledge in one of the groups and could not hold so many claims, and several were jumped, and talk of gun play was indulged in in regular old frontier style. No resort to arms resulted, however.

The news of the new strike spread rapidly, and men from all the towns in Northern California and in Lake county rushed madly to the scene of the strike, some even starting in the night. No one has yet taken the time to go down on the ledges of rock, but good prospects are found on the surface of the ground, and dirt taken from the small ravines in the neighbourhood and panned out went from \$1 to \$5 per pan, and small pieces of rock half the size of a man's hand, broken from the projecting edges of rock and mortared, showed a string of gold in the bottom of the pan from one to two inches long.

JEFFRIES PARTY OFF FOR THE MOUNTAINS

Four-Horse Wagon Load of Provisions Follow the Pugilist to Belknap Springs—Two Three-Seated Rigs Carry the Party

The Jeffries hunting party left here this morning shortly after eight o'clock for Belknap Springs. They expect to reach their destination some time tomorrow, taking their time on the road and will camp on the banks of the McKenzie tonight. The party left in two three-seated rigs and a wagon load of provisions, drawn by four horses, left earlier in the morning.

The party secured hunting licenses at the county clerk's office yesterday afternoon. In his application Jeffries describes himself as follows: Residence, Los Angeles; age, 31 years; height, 6 feet 2 inches; weight, 240 pounds; color of hair, brown; complexion, dark.

W. OREGON COAST AND EASTERN SURVEYORS HERE

Arrived in Eugene Today From Florence—Bailed to Portland to Commence Location Work—Easy Grades Along the Coast Between Toledo and Siuslaw

The party of surveyors who have been running preliminary lines along the coast in the Siuslaw country for the Oregon Coast & Eastern railway arrived in Eugene from Florence today, having been ordered to proceed to Portland to begin the work of permanent location. Four of the party arrived this forenoon and consisted of the following: L. H. Campbell, Lambert Williams, Fred Stanton and Carl Ghorne, all well known in Eugene. The remainder of the party, eight in number, arrived later in the day. Mr. Williams stated to a Guard reporter that the surveyors encountered very easy grades between Toledo and Florence, the territory in which they worked, and for a mountainous country the conditions are ideal for a railway line. He said the people along the coast have faith in the enterprise and are giving it every encouragement possible. The fact that the surveyors have been called in to do permanent location work is alone an indication that the project is no "hot air" scheme.

ALBANY FILTERS IN OPERATION

Albany Democrat: The two new modern waterworks filters are running all the time at the central station of the Willamette Valley Company. Their capacity is sufficient to meet all the demands of the city, although during the irrigation season while being regulated it crowds the filters. Whatever dirt there was in the pipes of the city will gradually be washed out, and then Albany will have the cleanest and purest water it is possible to secure. The water has always been uncontaminated as a rule, in the more than thirty years of the canal no epidemic having occurred from its use. With the filter it will give the city a splendid water service, and the establishment of the system is one of the most important things of the year. A 20,000 gallon tank has been installed for flushing purposes.
