A Lively "Off Year"

For an "off year" the campaigns of 1906 are rousing unusual public interest, says the New York Evening Post. In four states—Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Ohio and Virginia—governors are to be elected. In Pennsylvania a state treasurer is to be chosen, and in Maryland a suffrage amendment, which has led to a fierce campaign, is to be submitted to the voters. Georgia is the scene of an exciting canvass for the Democratic primary nomination for governor, and in a number of other states legislatures are to be chosen that will have the election of a United States senatorship. Among these will be New Jersey, where a successor to Senator Dryden is to be chosen, and Tennessee, where Senator Carmack and ex-Governor Taylor are fighting for control of the legislature.

Various municipal campaigns have also developed into contests of country-wide importance like the three-cornered mayoralty fight in New York city, Jerome's independent appeal, the city party revolt in Philadelphia, the Johnson-Boyd contest in Cleveland, and the anti-Schmitt campaign in San Francisco.

The Portland Telegram prints a railroad map of Western Oregon, showing the Eugene-Weed route, which is said to be destined for the main line of the Southern Pacific into California. It's all right except that our sister city of Springfield is ignored, although it is sure to come in for a good share of the prosperity and business resulting from the building of the new road. A wide-awake rivalry between Eugene and Springfield, if both will fight fair, would be the best thing that could happen for both towns because it will keep them awake to every opportunity for advancement. Competition is admittedly the life of business and that it will prove a boon to both towns in this case is our prediction. That's why we would like to have seen the sawmill city on the map, where it belongs.

The slaughter at the Stolypin reception in St. Petersburg recently was marked by utter deperation on the part of the assassins. Two of them were killed and two were badly wounded. They all acted with a degree of coolness and audacity that must spread terror, inasmuch as there are more left of such revolutionists. They are plentiful in Moscow as well as St. Petersburg. Modern history teaches that the Russian system of oppression cannot endure. Instead of relying on bayonets Czar Nicholas should give the Russian people a broad measure of liberty and place full reliance on it.

Theodore Roosevelt broke the general rule when he became a successful politician after writing a book—in fact, a whole library of them. This leads us to the conclusion that he may even be able to remodel the English language without being ridiculed into oblivion.

Perhaps John D. Rockefeller's oil trust is only buying up all the distilleries of the country just to close them. A good Christian like the billionaire would not think of making money selling whiskey—unless it

would be to enable him to give even larger contributions to the missionary fund.

Another big bank, this time in conservative Philadelphia, has failed because its president speculated with its funds. The arguments in favor of stricter banking laws are multiplying daily.

Mayor Harry Lane has been making good ever since he went into office but his most commendable act was the "firing" of Portland's bunch of so-called detectives.
