FIRE DOES DAMAGE ON WINBERRY CREEK

Barn and Hay Burned - Southern Pacific Right-of-Way Agent Establishing Stations in Vicinity of Lowell

Lowell, Aug. 23.—Fire is doing some damage on the Winberry. It started from Hills Bros.' donkey engine, but it has got out to the old Winberry barn and will not be likely to do any more damage than has already been done. The Lyons barn was burned with three and one-half tons of hay and some damage to a small amount of timber being logged by Hills Bros. The fire is now under control.

STEAM SHOVEL SENT TO CALIFORNIA

To Assist in Clearing Away a Big Land Slide—Another One From Portland Will Take Its Place Here

The big steam shovel which has been taking out gravel from the railroad company's new pit across the river for the past several weeks was started on its way to Northern California about 10 o'clock this morning, having been ordered to help clear away the big landslide which occurred near Dunsmuir yesterday. The slide is said to be the largest that has occurred in the Siskiyou for a long time and it will probably take several weeks to clear it entirely away. Northbound trains are all delayed, but stubs will be sent north from Ashland or Roseburg until a temporary track around the slide is laid.

Another steam shovel is expected to arrive here from Portland this evening to take the place of the one just taken out. The reason the one here was sent to California is that it will reach the slide several hours before the one from Portland could. Work will be resumed at the gravel pit as soon as the other machine is set up.

ENGLISH HOP ACREAGE LARGELY REDUCED

Portland, Aug. 23.—A London cable received by Isaac Pines & Sons, of Tacoma, said that the official estimate of the English hop acreage, issued yesterday, shows a reduction from last year of 2245 acres. The acreage now in hops in England is 48,723, the smallest acreage in the last quarter of a century. In addition to this reduction the crop has suffered worse this season from lice than for many years past, so it would not be surprising if the yield were indeed under the low estimates that have been made.

REBELS STILL ACTIVE IN LITTLE CUBA

Havana, Aug. 23.—Mabroquetir is reported as having entered Cabanas with a large band of insurgents and the rebels have removed the rails on the Cuban Central railway, in the southern part of Santa Clara. The Rurales brought in seventeen captives today.

The former mayor of Cruces returned to that village today at the head of a hundred men, sacked the stores and occupied the town of Consuelo for the rebels.
