HOP CARNIVAL IN EUGENE PROPOSED

Merchants' Protective Association Will Discuss Matter at Tonight's Meeting--Question of Postponing Opening Date of Public Schools Will Come up

The Merchants' Protective Association at a special meeting tonight will discuss the matter of holding a hop carnival this fall. Lane county is one of the heaviest producers of hops in the state and a fitting celebration of good prices and a good yield would be a carnival to be held at the close of the picking season.

The question of postponing the opening of the public schools till after the hopping season closes will also be discussed, and it is probable that the school board will be asked to take such action. The schools are scheduled to open on Monday, September 7. Many of the pupils will be engaged in the hop fields at that time, and it is argued that by postponing the opening date the pupils, the hop growers and the schools will all be benefited.

MAGAZINE ADVERTISEMENT. Arrangements will probably be made at tonight's meeting to answer the several hundred letters received within the past three weeks from persons all over the country asking for information concerning Eugene and Lane county in reply to the advertisement placed by the association in a recent number of the Pacific Monthly. The association is very agreeably surprised at the number of letters of inquiry received as a result of the advertisement and the members feel that the money was well spent. Arrangements will probably be made to get out some attractive literature at once to send to these people who have written to the association.

APPOINT DELEGATES. Delegates to the Willamette Valley Development League, which meets September 17, at Forest Grove, will be appointed. It is also probable that a delegate will be named to attend a meeting in the near future to organize a state association among the merchants.

THE CAR SHORTAGE IS LESS ACUTE

Many Empties Coming Out of California and Sidetracked Loads Sent to Destinations

Agent E. A. Neal of the Southern Pacific Company stated yesterday afternoon that the indications were good for an early breaking of the car shortage that has so seriously embarrassed both the Southern Pacific Company and the shippers all along the company's lines. In San Francisco the piled up loads are being unloaded rapidly and the empty cars are beginning to come up to Oregon and it is expected that in a short time conditions will again be normal.

All loads set on sidetracks in Oregon during the past month owing to the fact that California sidetracks were crowded with loaded cars, have been ordered forwarded except those for San Francisco and Oakland. Those billed to Berkeley, Lathrop, Tracy and other California points have been ordered forwarded as fast as possible and extra freight trains will be running for the next few weeks taking out the sidetracked loads for California points. This will relieve the pressure materially and the empty cars coming back will be hailed with delight by the shippers of the state who have become worried over threatening car shortage on the Oregon lines. (Albany Herald.)

THRESHING MACHINE DESTROYED BY FIRE

Gravelle & Maxwell's threshing machine, while at work on Gray Brook farm a few miles below Eugene on the river road, was destroyed by fire Tuesday afternoon between four and five o'clock. A hot box on the machine caused the blaze. The fire spread to the straw stacks, and it was with difficulty that it was prevented from burning the grain.
