PARIS HOUSE HABITUES IN POLICE COURT

Marguerite Johnson and Blanche Smith Each Fined \$50 - Two Young Men Fined \$20 Each for Assaulting Officer Bonney

A well-planned raid on the lodging house at fifth and Willamette streets, known as the "Paris House," was made last night about 12 o'clock by Chief of Police Farrington and Night Officers Parly and Bonney. The two women inmates, Marguerite Johnson and Blanche Smith, were taken into custody and lodged in the city jail. On the way to the jail two young men among the crowd following the officers and the women assaulted Officer Bonney and were afterwards arrested. In the melee a window in Herbert Leigh's assay office was broken and there was a general scuffle, one of the boys arrested being hit a terrific blow on the forehead with Bonney's "billy."

The women and the two young men appeared in the police court this forenoon. The case of the women, charged with keeping a bawdy house, was postponed till two o'clock this afternoon. The young men, whose names are withheld from publication by request of relatives who are highly respectable citizens, pleaded guilty to the charge of assaulting an officer and were each fined \$20, the amount being paid.

When the case was called for trial this afternoon the municipal court room was crowded to suffocation. C. M. Kiesinger appeared as attorney for the women and City Attorney Bean acted as counsel for the prosecution. A large number of witnesses were examined and the trial occupied a greater part of the afternoon.

Both women were found guilty and fined \$50 each. Bill Vaughn paid the Johnson woman's fine but the other one had not raised the money up to a late hour this afternoon.

ANOTHER PORTLAND-SALEM TROLLEY LINE

Salem, Or., Aug. 29.—It is now generally believed here that the electric line between this city and Portland, closely paralleling the Southern Pacific and keeping altogether on the east side of the Willamette river, will be speedily built. John B. Ryan, of Portland, has filed in the office of the county recorder the contracts for all the right of way for the road in Marion county. This gives the company a clear right of way except over two or three small farms, and Mr. Ryan said that he thought no difficulty would be experienced in obtaining these.

The contracts are made in the name of Alex Sweek, attorney, and it is believed here that the O. W. P. & Ry. Co. is the power behind the movement. Mr. Ryan has been at work for some time in securing a right of way in Clackamas county, and this work is also practically complete. Mr. Ryan will leave here today for Willhoit Springs, and will at once proceed to get a right of way for the company from Oregon City up the Molalla river to Willhoit Springs.

It is believed that the company will at once build the road from Canemah to Salem and from Oregon City to Willhoit Springs.

It is not positively known, but it is believed that all arrangements have been made to run the cars into Salem over the present tracks of the Willamette Traction Company, and in so Portland over the O. W. P. line from Canemah. That will leave only about 37 miles of track to build to connect Salem with Portland.

The right-of-way contracts call for the completion of the road by July 1 next, and this will make the speedy construction of the line a necessity.

L. BONNEY APPOINTED MAIL CARRIER

A notice to the effect that L. Bonney was the successful bidder for the position of mail carrier between the postoffice and depot in this city was received this morning and he will begin his duties on September first, succeeding J. N. Cole, who has been carrying the mail for the last several months. Mr. Bonney is at present acting as night policeman in the place of Geo. Croner, who is up the McKenzie on an outing. Mr. Bonney's bid was \$300 a year.
