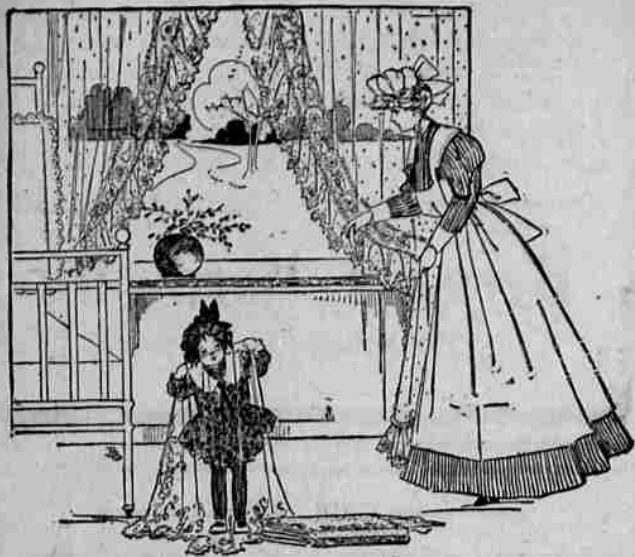

BRIDGE CREW EXPECTED ON EVERY TRAIN

Only Few Days Until Railroad Bridge Across Willamette at Springfield Will Be Completed—Branch Will Then Be Ready for Operation of Trains

Engineer C. S. Freeland, in charge of the erecting the Southern Pacific Company's big bridge across the Willamette at Springfield, informed a Guard reporter today that he is expecting the crew of men to erect the steel portion of the bridge on every train. The work of erecting the bridge will occupy only a few days, and when it is completed the entire branch line will be ready for trains to operate over it. The bridges across the mill race in Springfield have been completed, the rails all laid and the connections made with the main lines at Springfield and Springfield Junction.

PORTLAND BOYS MAKE LONG TRIP IN CANOE

Gilbert Herren and Myron Baldwin, two Portland High school boys, arrived home yesterday after a two weeks' canoeing trip down the Willamette river from Eugene. The boys shipped their canoe, outfit, fox terrier and themselves to Eugene by train and drifted and paddled the 170 miles down the river from that point. The boys shot all the rapids on the way, among them the Harriabur and Corvallis rapids, both of which are considered to be quite dangerous. The bridge builders at Harriabur told the boys that they were the first to make the trip over the Harriabur rapids successfully. During the season the attempt has been made a number of other times, but in each case the boat has been overturned and the passengers spilled in the water. At night the boys camped on the shore.—Journal.

Conrad Widmer

Conrad Widmer, father of George C. Widmer of Eugene and Joseph M., Margaret M., and Gertrude D. Widmer of Seattle, Wash., died at the family home, Saturday, August 25, 1906.

Mr. Widmer was born in Balderswell, Baden Germany, November 23, 1829, being at the time of his death 76 years, 9 months and 2 days. He came to the United States in 1849, making his home in Ohio, Indiana and Kentucky till 1857 when he started for the Pacific coast by way of the Isthmus of Panama. He spent a few months in Marquette and Sacramento, California, in 1857 he came to Eugene, where he had since made his home.

Mr. Widmer was always a public-spirited citizen, and did all that was in his power to help build up our present prosperous community. He was in business in Eugene from 1857 till 1872, when he moved to his beautiful farm home, where he resided up to the time of his death. He built the store building occupied by S. H. Friendly and the first story of what is now called the Fickett building, in 1868, those being the first and second brick buildings now standing in Eugene.

He was married to Miss Elizabeth Ebler in Oregon City, Oct. 8, 1861. To them seven children were born, five daughters, three of whom died in infancy, and two sons. Mrs. Widmer died July 2, 1898.

The funeral services were held at the family residence Monday afternoon, August 27, 1906, Rev. H. N. Mount, of the Presbyterian church, officiating. The interment was made in the family lot in the I. O. O. F. cemetery.

Portland Maroons Will Play Against Springfield and Eugene Teams. Springfield Game Will Be for Championship

A championship game between the Portland Maroons and the Springfield Blues will be played on the Springfield baseball grounds next Sunday afternoon, Sept. 2. In the announcement of the game the Springfield management makes the following statement:

"The Maroons were champions of Oregon in 1905. The Woodburn team took the title from them in their first game this season. They, in turn lost it to the Trunkmakers; the Trunkmakers lost it to the Schillers, the Maroons won it back when they defeated the Schillers, and there it now rests. The Maroons and Springfield Blues have each won a game from the other. Next Sunday's game decides the amateur championship of Oregon."

A game has been arranged to be played on the Eugene grounds Monday afternoon, September 3, between the Portland Maroons and a team picked up from the many good players in this city. The lineup of the local team will probably be as follows: Hard, pitcher; Johnson, catcher; Paine, first base; Hobbs, second base; Smith, shortstop; Perret, third base; Humphrey, left field, Branstetter, right field; Driver, centre field.
