Troubles of Cuba

Friends of good government and liberty all over the world are sorely disappointed that Cuba is again in the throes of an insurrection. It had been hoped that the little republic would rise to the occasion and found a stable government, giving full security to life and property. Just the true condition of affairs down there is hard to determine from the conflicting reports sent out to the newspapers, but it is bad enough anyway.

Perhaps the only ray of light is that which is shed abroad because of a fear among those of both parties that the United States will feel it necessary to intervene. While the revolutionist leaders, or some of them, have professed to favor the idea of intervention by our government, the general sentiment seems to be against the idea—that is, people do not wish to have the island placed in the position of having its troubles settled by a neighbor.

This feeling has given rise to demands from people of both sides that a truce be called so the difficulty may be adjusted, thus avoiding outside interference. These demands are insistent, and it is possible the leaders on both sides will yield to them. However, up to this time there is nothing to indicate such a result will be witnessed. President Palma has ceased talking of amnesty for the rebels and is declaring that he will crush the insurrection, while the insurgents seem to be entirely willing to fight it out on the field of battle if the president will not yield without first having been beaten in the shock of armed conflict.

In the September Century A. V. Williams Jackson has an article giving his observations on a visit to a community of Zoroastrians in Persia. The fact that such a community exists is new to most readers. It appears those people survived the oppression of the followers of Mahomet, maintaining themselves in mountain fastnesses, and there they have preserved the religion that was founded 700 years before the advent of Christ. Mr. Jackson visited a similar settlement in India founded by Zoroastrians who escaped to that region from the Moslem power. The reader is struck by the creed of those people. Their cardinal teaching is "good thoughts, good words, good deeds." Any people who practice that creed will come pretty nearly being Christians, no matter what conception they may have of Deity.

The United States ship Boston, which has met with a mishap, is an unarmored cruiser, which was built in 1883 and took part in the Spanish-American war of 1898. She cost \$619,000. Her captain, Commander De Witt Hoffman, received his commission in June, 1905. Her tonnage is 3035.

When people learn, as they should, that the associations of the men who engage in any way in prizefighting cannot but make them crooked they will cease to believe that the "home" fighter is a myth, remarks an exchange.

It has been shown recently that the United States is getting armor plate considerably cheaper than England. The latter has been paying nearly

\$500 a ton, while the American government has been getting the steel for \$440. Now a contract has been entered into at \$345, nearly \$150 less than the British rate. That shows either that we can make plate at less cost than the English steel men or that our government is a better buyer.

Senator Heyburn, in his opposition to the forest reserve policy of the government, endorsed by the big timber syndicates, is right and is backed by the people of his state. The great trouble with Senator is that he is not diplomatic and has a remarkable facility for making personal enemies. Another man might take up the same fight and win where Heyburn is almost sure to fail.

The county commissioners should do their best to straighten out the Blue River road tangle without any unnecessary delay. It is a very important matter, affecting the city of Eugene and all Lane county as well.

It is announced now that Teddy Roosevelt, Jr., was not at the Gans-Nelson prize fight. It was only a case of mistaken identity, whereas certain admirers of the elder Teddy are sorely disappointed.
