The Dispensary Law

The dispensary law of South Carolina, whereby the state assumed control of the liquor traffic, has been watched as an interesting experiment by students of the drink problem everywhere. By many it was hoped that at last a solution to a very difficult question had been arrived at, because the state dispensary eliminated the saloon, assured the purity of all liquor on sale and removed all opportunity for private gain from the traffic.

As to its actual success there have been conflicting reports sent out through the newspapers. The liquor business conducted by the state has grown to enormous proportions. Opponents of the system declare it has given rise to much corruption, which Tillman holds can be remedied and is not to be charged to the system. It was a bold experiment made under the leadership of a bold and somewhat erratic man. Its author stands up for it, and it is probable that many evils that have appeared in connection with it are chargeable to the men administering the law rather than to the law itself.

The dispensary law was an issue in the late democratic primaries in South Carolina, and Senator Tillman is credited with winning but half a victory. While his candidate for governor was defeated, he carried a good majority of the county candidates. This, it is assumed, means that the legislature will still stand by the dispensary law.

There is a great deal of tax dodging in Chicago, despite all schemes to equalize the levy. For instance there are \$300,000,000 on deposit in banks and yet the entire personal property on the assessment rolls of Cook county is \$500,000,000. The valuations of the houses have been increased \$11,000,000, not because of former tax dodging but on account of the increase in business. Apart from this assessment the real estate held by the Chicago banks is valued at between \$11,000,000 and \$12,000,000. The revenues have been increased the railroad valuation one hundred millions (\$100,000,000).

Our friend, Bro. Gault, of the Cottage Grove Western Oregon, seems to be in trouble. He criticized the action of one of the councilmen for opposing the granting of an electric light franchise to the Willamette Valley Co., whereat the councilman became considerably wroth: In the last issue of the Western Oregon is the following:
