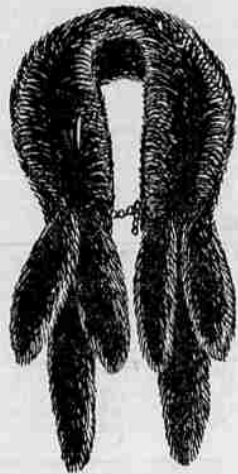

RUSSIAN GIRL DIED BRAVELY ON SCAFFOLD

With Cry for Liberty Still on Lips Was Swung Into Eternity—Concerted Action to Suppress Terrorists—More Jews Are Reported Murdered

St. Petersburg, Sept. 13.—Zonaide Koneplianikova, the girl who assassinated General Min, was executed today. After the rope had been placed about her neck she exclaimed: "Long live social revolution for our land and liberty."

She was swung into eternity before the echoes of her voice had died out.

TO SUPPRESS TERRORISTS. Russia has enlisted the aid of all European governments except England and Switzerland in an effort to suppress the terrorists of all governments. The combined police forces are seeking for Nihilists everywhere.

MAY KILL CONSULS. Warsaw, Sept. 13.—The terrorists have renewed their threats to kill all the foreign consuls unless the government massacres cease, in the hope of forcing the intervention of the powers. The excitement here is such that the slightest trouble may start extensive bloodshed.

JEW MURDERED. Odessa, Sept. 13.—Practically the entire population of the Jewish village of Cououding, in the district of Kamenetz, have been murdered by peasants, who burned the place to the ground. The bodies of the victims were maltreated.

HIBERNIA BANK DEPOSITORS WANT THEIR MONEY

San Francisco, Sept. 13.—The run on the Hibernia Savings Bank continues. The line of depositors seeking to withdraw their funds is two blocks long this morning, and if the run continues much longer it will assume a serious aspect. It is likely to affect other institutions as well.

TRUST CONCERN RESUMES. Philadelphia, Sept. 13.—Receiver Earle today re-opened the Real Estate Trust company to receive deposits, all interested having accepted Earle's plan of re-organization by which the directors are responsible for all former deposits.

LARGE CROWDS DESPITE THE RAIN

Salem, Sept. 13.—Notwithstanding the dawn of day brought with it a drenching rain, with a high wind and indications of the storm indefinitely, the temporary disappointment of the great mass of people assembled in the city yesterday to witness one of the greatest days of the fair, was supplanted by encouragement and ultimate pleasure when, shortly before noon, the storm broke and the clouds began to scatter. The promise of favorable weather brought out the crowd in great numbers, and before noon street cars and every means of conveyance were literally packed the entire route to the grounds.

Before the race program opened the grandstand was packed to overflowing and standing room in front was at a premium. Shortly after noon, notwithstanding the rain, the crowd, it is estimated, numbered about 15,000.

EMPLOYEES BURIED BY COLLAPSED ROOF

Oakland, Sept. 13.—The roof of the California Fruit Cannery's Association building collapsed at noon, wrecking the building and burying a number of employees.

All were taken out alive, but two women were seriously hurt. Six others were hurt.

PROSECUTOR HENEY CONVICTS THREE MORE ALLEGED LAND FRAUDERS

State Senator Franklin Mays, Willard W. Jones and George Sorenson Declared Guilty by Jury of Federal Court - May Be Imprisoned Two Years With Fine of Ten Thousand Dollars Each - Convicted of Conspiracy To Defraud Government in Land Matters

Portland, Sept. 13.—The jury this morning in the federal court returned a verdict, finding the defendants, Franklin P. Mays, Willard N. Jones and George Sorenson, each guilty as charged of conspiracy to defraud the government of its public lands in the Blue Mountain reserve. The case went to the jury at midnight.

The maximum penalty is two years' imprisonment and a fine of \$10,000.

The defendants were indicted for conspiracy to defraud the government in the creation of the reserve, securing in advance large quantities

of state school land within the proposed boundaries to use as a base for land scripping schemes when the lands within the reserve were withdrawn from settlement. In order to do this the government showed in the trial that the defendants hired hundreds of persons to apply for school lands, paying them very small amounts, the certificates being assigned to the defendants or those in collusion with them.

Congressmen Williamson and Hermann are both under indictment as conspirators, as was also the late Senator Mitchell.

LANE COUNTY EXHIBIT AWARDED SECOND PRIZE

Salem, Sept. 13.—The jury of awards on the county exhibits this forenoon gave Lane county second prize. Marion won first, Jackson third, Linn fourth, Douglas fifth, Benton sixth, and Columbia seventh.

The Lane county exhibit was gathered by E. M. Warren, who was assisted in placing it in position by

Romeo M. Gilbert, of Eugene. The committee appointed by the county court to have charge of the money appropriated for the exhibit consists of Mr. Warren, P. E. Snodgrass and Jasper Wilkins. Heretofore Lane county has been considerably behind Linn, Marion and several other counties in the matter of an exhibit at the state fair and has never before won a higher award than fifth or sixth prize. The showing this year calls for congratulations.

LUMBERMEN'S MEETING SATURDAY EVENING

The regular monthly business meeting of the Oregon and Washington Lumber Manufacturers' Association will be held in the parlors of the Eugene Commercial Club Saturday evening of this week. Between 20 and 30 members are expected to be in attendance. If the weather is good they will be driven about the city in carriages and at four o'clock taken to the university where a demonstration will be made at the government timber testing station. The business meeting will begin at 7:30 o'clock and a banquet will be spread at the Smeede Hotel at 10 o'clock.

JOHN WALLACE FOUND NOT GUILTY

John Wallace, accused of stealing a shotgun from C. D. McBee, of Irving, was arrested at Marcola by Constable Plank yesterday and brought to Eugene. He was given a trial before Justice of the Peace Bryson this afternoon. The following jury was chosen: J. M. Gearhart, W. S. Moon, Albert Hendricks, A. L. Ball and Frank Wood. The state was represented by Attorney E. O. Potter and the defendant by L. Bilyen. The jury late this afternoon returned a verdict of not guilty.

LABOR LEADERS PLACED ON TRIAL

Chicago, Sept. 13.—Shea and other labor leaders, charged with conspiracy to ruin the business of Montgomery, Ward & Co., during the teamsters' strike of 1905 were arraigned this morning and, pleaded not guilty. The selection of the jury began at once.

HAVANA MAY BE ATTACKED BY INSURGENTS

Condition in Cuban Republic Rapidly Becoming Chaotic—United States Has Situation Well in Hand and Large Force of Troops Ready for Emergency

Washington, Sept. 13.—The state department's advices today indicate that an attack upon Havana is imminent. Consul Sleeper's dispatches are understood to fully confirm the press reports of conditions, which are approaching chaos. No apprehension is felt here, as the government is fully able to quickly restore order if force is needed. Five thousand regulars are encamped at Chickamauga and could be embarked at Tampa within thirty-six hours, and others could follow quickly, as many ships of war are within a few hours' sail of the embarking ports.

CONSULTS PRESIDENT. Secretary Bonaparte goes this afternoon to consult President Roosevelt as regards Cuba.

REBEL SUCCESSES. Cienfuegos, Sept. 13.—The insurgents captured a train, burned the depot and bridge, and robbed the city treasury at Cruces. American property is being seized. The rebels were repulsed at Ranchulo.

REBELS SWARMING. Havana, Sept. 12. Rebels are swarming thirteen miles out and 400 reinforcements have been brought to protect the city.

O. R. & N. TRAINS IN COLLISION NEAR DURKEE

Baker City, Sept. 13.—A head-on collision on the O. R. & N. occurred between No. 1, westbound passenger, and an extra freight this side of Durkee this morning.

The wreck was caused by a runaway freight, the brakes failing to work. One fireman was injured by jumping but none were killed. Fifteen cars were derailed and the engines smashed.

DEMOCRATS NAME BELL FOR GOVERNOR

Sacramento, Sept. 13.—Theodore A. Bell, a former congressman, was nominated for governor and Thomas O. Toland, of Ventura county, for lieutenant governor by the Democratic state convention yesterday.

The head of the ticket was given the nomination by acclamation and tremendous enthusiasm was manifested when he was carried to the platform to make his address of acceptance. Handbells of all kinds were rung and it was fully five minutes before the applause subsided.

YOUNG STENSLAND TRUE TO FATHER

Chicago, Sept. 13.—Theodore Stensland declares as false all insinuations that he betrayed his father. He says his father is not a thief and that his estate will cover all the shortage that Cashier Hering is the real culprit. Theodore says he closed the bank against the advice of James B. Forgan and other financiers.

HILL-HARRIMAN COMBINE ALLEGED

Washington, Sept. 13.—The hearing in Chicago by the Interstate Commerce Commission to probe into the controversy between the Harriman and Hill lines and competing roads in trans-continental business, was resumed today. It is charged that the two magnates have formed a huge pool to control trans-continental and export business and Pacific shipping.
