SAYS ENEMIES ARE TRYING TO KILL HIM

Egner Auerdahl, Norwegian, Just From Portland, Tells Story to Local Officers - Says He Is Constantly Followed and Threatened By Two Men and a Woman

Egner Auerdahl, a Norwegian who arrived here from Portland three or four days ago, is either laboring under a strange hallucination or has some enemies who are trying to get rid of him. Yesterday he reported to Chief of Police Farrington that two men and a woman had followed him here from Portland with the intention of killing him and had attempted to break into his room at the Howe lodging house the night before. An investigation was made, but no one else who had seen the people or had heard any unusual noises at the lodging house that night could be found. Auerdahl says the name of one of the men whom he says are seeking his life is Kristian Torgersen, but he does not know the other man nor the woman. He describes the woman as being tall and wearing a blue dress and straw hat. He says he knew Torgersen in Norway before coming to America.

Last night shortly after nine o'clock Auerdahl hunted up Night Officer Croner and told him that the trio had just attempted to hold him up in the vicinity of the First National bank. He said one of the men pointed a pistol at him and the woman urged him to shoot. At that juncture Auerdahl said he ran and soon got away from his tormentors. Again the officer could find no one and came to the conclusion that the man was demented. This morning the chief of police made the rounds of all the hotels and lodging houses, but was unable to find any one of the description given by Auerdahl.

The man says that while in Portland recently he had the three persons arrested but he did not appear in court to prosecute them and they were released. The officers here believe he is insane and his arrest and examination before a lunacy commission may soon occur.

PRICE OF PICKING HOP ADVANCES HALF A CENT

The present rain has caused the price of picking hops in at least three yards in the vicinity of Eugene to advance from one cent to a cent and a half a pound, and that price has prevailed in those yards since yesterday. As soon as the rain began pickers commenced to desert the yards, and in order to hold them the owners decided to make this advance, with the result that a majority of the pickers have remained. The yards in which the old price prevails are almost deserted.

ARRESTED FOR VIOLATING THE FISH LAW

Milton A. Nicolle was tried before Justice of the Peace D. E. Severy at Florence last Tuesday on the charge of violating the state fish law by fishing for salmon in the Siuslaw river above Mapleton on August 27.—The following jury was called: E. H. Anderson, Ivy Morris, Otto Shrader, Robert Lynch, F. E. Raymond and John W. Tanner.

After a large number of witnesses had been examined the jury retired and soon returned a verdict of not guilty. Joe Morris, Jr., appeared as attorney, for the state and J. E. Barnes for the defendant.
