CONVENTION OF W. C. T. U. IN SESSION

Met at Methodist Church This Fore-
noon and Will Continue Over Fri-
day--Reports of Secretary and
Treasurer Show Good Condition
of County Union

White ribbons are in evidence in
Eugene, the annual county W. C. T. U.
convention having convened at the
M. E. church this forenoon for a
two days' session. Mrs. Lucia F. Ad-
diton, state president, is in attend-
ance. The number of delegates from
outside of Eugene present at today's
sessions is smaller than if the weather
had been better, but what the meet-
ings lack in attendance is made up in
enthusiasm.

The convention was called to order
at 10 o'clock by County President
Anna J. Calkins. Consecration ser-
vices were led by Miss Lund, deacon-
ess of the M. E. church, followed by
roll call of officers and superinten-
dents.

The report of the secretary indicat-
ed a healthy gain in membership dur-
ing the past year. Four Loyal Tem-
perance Leagues have been organized.
The treasurer's report showed a to-
tal footing of \$51.15. The disburse-
ments were \$39.28, leaving a balance
on hand of \$11.87.
