## FAIRBANKS STANDS FIRM BY CORPORATIONS

In Speech at Laying of Court House Corner Stone in Chicago, Vice President Denounces Government and Municipal Ownership of Public Utilities -- Mayor Dunne Occupies Platform During Address

Chicago, Sept. 21.--The corner stone of Cook county's \$5,000,000 courthouse was laid this afternoon. Vice President Fairbanks, Governor Dineen, Mayor Dunne and the county officials were the principal participants. A military parade preceded the exercises.

Vice President Fairbanks, in his address, felicitated the county upon its prosperity and greatness, and with Mayor Dunne, the apostle of municipal ownership on the platform, launched into a denunciation of government or state ownership of railroads or any other public utility, the administration of which, he declared, properly belonged to the people in their individual or corporate capacity.

He said that government ownership would be a step toward the destruction of the present form of government.

## TIMBER LAND DEAL IN LINN COUNTY

Albany, Or., Sept. 21.--Five thousand two hundred acres of splendid timber land, embracing all the holdings of the Charles A. Street Lumber Company, an Eastern corporation, in Linn and Marion counties, were sold yesterday to the Curtis Lumber Company for \$105,300. Part of this tract was in the zone of the big forest fires near Detroit, and the fire is probably responsible to some extent for the transfer, as the burned timber will have to be logged off in the next two seasons in order to save it.

The land lies along both banks of the North Santiam river, below Detroit, and along the Breitenbush river and French creek.

## UPTON SINCLAIR, AUTHOR OF "THE JUNGLES"

A feature of yesterday's session of the Lane county teachers' institute was the review by Professor Hartranft



of Upton Sinclair's book, "The Jungle," an expose of the Chicago packing house conditions. The address was listened to very attentively.

Upton Sinclair, author of "The Jungle," which started the investigation into the Chicago packing houses, was born in 1878 and educated at the College of the City of New York and Columbia University. By the time he was seventeen he had produced a literary output, remarkable in point of quantity at least, for he had written several stories, one a romance of 80,000 words. He lived for four years in shanties and tents in Canada, after subsisting on game, and in this way wrote "King Midas." His next story, "Prince Hazen," was at first rejected by all the publishers, and the winter following its completion he nearly starved in New York. It was then that he wrote "The Journal of Arthur Stirling," which embodied his experiences.

## KENTUCKY MINING TOWN IS WRECKED BY EXPLOSION

Two Cars of Dynamite Exploded With Frightful Loss of Life and Damage to Property---Every Warehouse Destroyed and Other Business Buildings Damaged -- Woman Burned To Death In Early Morning Fire at Tacoma --- Heavy Property Loss

Jellico, Tenn., Sept. 21.--Two car loads of dynamite exploded here this morning. The Standard Oil tank was destroyed and several buildings were wrecked. It is reported there are many dead, the rumors estimating the list at from seventy to one hundred. The explosion occurred on the Louisville & Nashville railroad tracks near the depot.

By noon ten bodies had been removed from the debris and the property loss was reported at a million dollars.

When exploded the train was being switched a hundred yards north of the station, near the centre of the town, and every warehouse along the railroad was entirely destroyed and nearly every store is an entire wreck,

or so badly damaged that business is impossible.

Jellico is a town of four thousand inhabitants in a mining district on the Kentucky state line.

This afternoon it is known that at least fifteen are dead and two hundred injured. Some of the wounded will probably die.

#### WOMAN BURNED TO DEATH.

Tacoma, Sept. 21.--Mrs. J. C. Peterson was burned to death this morning in a fire which destroyed the Tacoma Eastern depot, two livery barns, a boarding house, restaurant and saloon. One hundred and fifty horses were burned to death. Two teamsters are missing. The property loss is \$200,000.

## VAN AUKER IS UNDER ARREST AT PORTLAND

Portland, Sept. 21.--A warrant was issued today for the arrest of G. S. Van Auker, cashier of the State Bank of Rainier, Oregon, accusing him of the embezzlement of \$1627 of the bank's funds. Van Auker escaped from the detectives last night and is now a fugitive from justice. He was seen in Portland this morning.

Van Auker was found bound in the bank on Labor Day and told a sensational story of having been held up by two men, who robbed the institution. Investigation resulted in the discovery that the cashier had lost large sums at gambling, and it is claimed he devised a fake robbery to cover his defalcations.

#### ARRESTED IN PORTLAND.

Portland, Sept. 21.--Cashier Van Auker was arrested this afternoon here. He will be taken to St. Helens for preliminary examination tomorrow.

## SUSPECTED CASHIER MAKES HIS ESCAPE

Portland, Or., Sept. 21.--C. S. Van Auker, cashier of the Rainier State bank which was looted Sept. 3, last made his escape from Sheriff White. Shortly before the train reached the union depot in this city it is alleged C. S. Van Auker eluded the deputy sheriff who was on hand to arrest him. Persons acquainted with the man and who were on the train state Van Auker boarded the train after the Rainier officers had searched it.

That C. S. Van Auker, the cashier of the State bank of Rainier, who claimed to have been up and robbed by bandits on Labor day, was himself the culprit, and bound, tied and gagged himself to carry out an ingenious scheme to cover his own peculations, is the theory of the detectives engaged on the case. They also declare that no money was taken on the day of the alleged robbery, but that the coin had been obtained by the cashier and gambled away previously. Van Auker refused to confess the robbery, but was very anxious to raise the \$1,627 he alleges was taken from him.

The S. P. pay car went through Eugene yesterday with the cash, something occasionally done to see if there are any dummies being manipulated in the sections along the way, not easy to keep track of under the check system.

## BATTLESHIPS REACH HAVANA THIS MORNING

Several Are Now In Harbor and More Will Be There Tomorrow -- Indications Are That Secretary Taft Will Not Be Able To Settle Cuban Trouble

Washington, Sept. 21.--The navy department despatches announce the arrival at Havana this morning of the battleships Louisiana and Virginia and the cruiser Tacoma. The Cleveland, Minneapolis and Newark are expected to arrive tonight or early in the morning.

#### MUST LAND ARMY.

Havana, Sept. 21.--The indications are that Secretary Taft will not be able to settle the difficulty without definite and real intention and the landing of an army.

## CITY OF SEATTLE IS STILL AGROUND

Seattle, Sept. 21.--The steamer City of Seattle is still aground at Trial Island. Her cargo is being lightered and another attempt will be made to float her at high water. The vessel has taken in no water and the weather is good.

#### THIS ONE FLOATED.

Midway Island, Sept. 21.--The stranded steamer Mongolia was floated this morning.

## BUSINESS RESUMED AT STRICKEN HONG KONG

Hong Kong, Sept. 21.--The Hutchison and West Kent regiments are working today, helping to clear the debris left by the typhoon. The dead are being carried away by carloads and shipping has been resumed, but is hampered by the scarcity of lighters, most of them having been destroyed.

The entire fleet of six hundred fishing junks was lost in the typhoon. This has increased the mortality to ten thousand.

## JULIA WARD HOWE "GRAND OLD LADY"

Mrs. Julia Ward Howe, author of "The Battle Hymn of the Republic," is sometimes called "the grand old lady of the United States." She was



born in 1819. Her husband, the late Dr. Samuel G. Howe, the philanthropist, whom she married in 1843, fought in the Greek struggle for liberty from Turkish oppression, and both husband and wife were greatly interested also in the Italian movement under Garibaldi.

## HARRIMAN NEGOTIATES FOR MORE RAILROADS

New York, Sept. 21.--Negotiations are in progress between Harriman, William Rockefeller and the Smith estate, as the result of which the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul may be turned over to the Union and Southern Pacific roads. Upon the outcome depends a deal by which the B. & O. may become part of the Harriman systems.

Corvallis, Or., Sept. 21.--In spite of the fact that the O. A. C. opened early this year, the first two days showed the largest enrollment for a similar time in the history of the institution, 498 being enrolled and many are still coming. This enrollment is an increase of 56 over last year. At this rate an enrollment of more than 900 will be reached this year. With an expectation of this four new professors and assistant professors have been added to the faculty force.

## PLEDGE THEIR SUPPORT TO ACCUSED LEADER

Chicago, Sept. 21.--The industrial workers of the world today adopted resolutions pledging their moral and financial support to Moyer, president of the Western Federation of Miners, now in jail at Boise, Idaho, charged with conspiracy in the murder of Ex-Governor Steunenberg.

## TOM LIPTON SAILS FOR THIS COUNTRY

Liverpool, Sept. 21.--Thomas Lipton, accompanied by "Tay Pay" O'Connor and wife, sailed for America today. It is understood that Lipton will challenge for the "America's" cup again before returning to England.
