INCREASED ATTENDANCE AT THE UNIVERSITY

Applications for Entrance Double What They Were Last Year
 Registration of Students Begins On **Wednesday, Sept. 26,** and **Classes Open On Monday, Oct. 1** - Many Improvements Made On Grounds and Buildings

Students are beginning to arrive in goodly numbers to enter the university, which opens for the 1906-07 term on Wednesday, September 26. The entrance examinations in English will be held Monday and Tuesday of next week and classes will begin on Monday, October 1, after which it is expected that the work will go on throughout the year uninterruptedly. In an interview today A. R. Tiffin, secretary to President Campbell, stated that the largest attendance in the history of the institution is expected this year. Twice as many applications for entrance have been received so far as were received at the corresponding time last year. While about one-half of the applicants who applied up to this time last year resided in Eugene, such is not the case this year, a great majority of them residing at outside points. The increase from Portland this year is very noticeable.

IMPROVEMENTS

During the summer vacation many improvements have been made about the campus and in the buildings. New cement sidewalks have been laid, the roofs of all the buildings repaired and repainted, new steps built at Villard hall, the toilets rearranged in the same building, the iron working shops doubled in capacity, new apparatus to the value of several thousand dollars installed in the mechanical department and much other work of minor importance done. Work on the new library building has been commenced and a big trench for the extension of the heating, water and sewer systems to the new building is being excavated.

ATHLETICS.

Hugo Bezdek, the new athletic director and football coach, who arrived from the East a few days ago, expresses himself as being well pleased with the outlook for a successful season of athletics, especially football. The players have begun to arrive and the new coach is beginning to gain an idea as to what kind of material he will have to work on. A majority of the members of last year's team will return this fall and the dopsters have already figured that Oregon will again win the Northwest championship.

Water Butterflies.
 Real water butterflies spread their lovely wings in the clear wavelets of the blue Mediterranean. Their scientific name is pteropoda, or wing footed. The commonest is perhaps the "boat butterfly." His body seems formed round a tiny brown kernel, the size of a grain of wheat, and is covered with a shell soft as gristle and almost transparent. His wings are large, round and clear as glass—so clear that before they can be examined they must be put in a saucer of water against a black ground. The shell is so loose that a mere touch separates it from the body. All the sea butterflies have on their tongues rows of strong pointed hooks. They are all flesh eaters. It is wonderful to watch through the transparent shell and almost equally transparent body the motions of the heart. These butterflies lay eggs, just like the land ones, and, like the land ones, are fond of warmth and light.

Treating Open Wounds.
 In the treatment of open wounds, where there has been surface injury only and the discharge has not been great, much benefit has been found to follow the simple plan of treatment here described. The part is well washed with warm water. It is patted dry. Then it is very freely covered with boric acid powder. Over all is laid a piece of linen. Now adhesive plaster is cut into strips so long that they can go right across the linen and be attached to the healthy skin. By means of six or more of such strips the line is securely fixed. Over this is placed a piece of cotton wool. Finally the part is neatly bandaged. Practically the air is now excluded from the sore part, and this is the reason for whatever good may result. The dressings are removed at the end of seven or ten days. The part is washed, then treated as before.

The memorial to the late Frederick W. Farrar which was recently placed in the nave of Canterbury cathedral, England, will be an object of interest to many American tourists, as the great English preacher and writer had many admirers in this country. He was dean



of Canterbury when he died, but was best known in the United States as "Canon Farrar," as he was canon of Westminster for many years before his elevation to the post he held at his death. He was an exponent of liberal theology and was widely known for his writings and addresses in opposition to the doctrine of everlasting punishment.
