**PORTLAND MARKET REPORT.**  
Portland, Ore., Sept. 21.—There is practically nothing over yesterday's report from the hop yards to add today. Picking is proceeding rapidly, according to advice from the different growing sections. As to damage, there are conflicting reports from lowland localities, but as a general thing the crop will be little injured from the rain of last week in upland districts. Samples coming in of hops cured before the rainstorms are quite up to grade, and dealers, as a rule, express the opinion that the balance will come along in satisfactory condition. This opinion, of course, is based on present conditions and with the promise proviso that weather keeps right until the end of harvest. There was a sale on sample yesterday of a small lot at 15½¢, but for the time being no great amount of business is looked for until next week, when a fairly accurate estimate can be figured out of the Oregon, Washington and California yield. In yesterday's cables the former estimates of 300,000 cwt. as England's yield is reiterated. Only the best grade hops are being harvested, growers instructing pickers to discard poor quality. The market there is unchanged. In Germany the output is turning out somewhat heavier than expected. At the same time the market has advanced slightly, there having been two advances since harvest began. Germans are being freely offered in both markets and are also offered in America.

**FRUIT TRADE LIGHT.**  
Owing principally to lack of supplies there was light trade with Front-street fruit merchants this morning. Apples, pears and plums were in fair supply, but peaches and grapes fell off, and prices generally were a little firmer. Three cars of bananas were unloaded, mostly in fairly good condition. Cantaloupes are not the glut they were last week, and prices resumed normal quotations for the season. \$1@1.25 per crate. Water-melons were in good supply and quoted at 7¢ per 100 lbs. Sweet potatoes are a fraction lower, this morning's price being 2¼¢ per lb. with supply good.

**FRESH MEATS IMPROVE.**  
There were better receipts of veals and hogs yesterday afternoon and this forenoon than for some days past and a good demand for both at ruling prices. With poultry, while the retail trade asks mostly for hens, there is no trouble disposing of all sorts. Eggs continue firm at 20½¢ @ 27¢, and in some quarters receipts were reported as more satisfactory. Butter is unchanged, though quite firm, at last week's advance.
