## NICKLIN RIDES ON A SPECIAL TRAIN

Southern Pacific Company Sends Passenger Coach and Locomotive to Take Eugene Merchant From Tallman to Lebanon

I. T. Nicklin, a well-known Eugene merchant, has the distinction of riding on a special train from Tallman to Lebanon, furnished by the Southern Pacific Co., and sent out from Albany for the express purpose of carrying him between the two places mentioned.

One day last week Mr. Nicklin was down in Marion and Linn counties on a business trip. He boarded the train at West Stayton, on the Woodburn-Natron branch, having bought a ticket for Lebanon, the terminus of the branch which crosses the Woodburn-Natron line at Tallman. When the conductor took up his ticket he was informed that the train was very late and it would be impossible to

catch the Lebanon train, as it had already gone on to Lebanon and returned to Albany. The conductor advised him to hire a vehicle and drive from Tallman to Lebanon, but Mr. Nicklin quietly but firmly replied that he had bought a ticket to that place and the railroad company would have to take him there. The conductor realized that he was "up against it," and wired the facts to headquarters at Portland, and when Tallman was reached a special train consisting of a passenger coach and locomotive was awaiting on the Lebanon branch, having been sent over from Albany. Mr. Nicklin, the sole occupant of the car, was whisked into Lebanon in quick order and as he alighted from his special train he was met by a plain merchant from Eugene.

## FORMER LANE COUNTY MAN KILLED

Joseph Schlee, Once a Resident of Cottage Grove, Shot Near Bremerton, Wash. - He Was Mistaken for a Deer

Joseph Schlee, at one time a resident of Cottage Grove, where he was engaged in merchandising, was shot and instantly killed near Bremerton, Wash., last week. Schlee was fond of deer hunting and on the day of the tragedy was on a still hunt for deer, accompanied by a young man. Coming upon a thick copse of brush the hunters separated, one going on one side and the other circling the opposite way. Schlee had sat on a log. His dog was at his feet and made some noise. The young man, hearing this and seeing a form among the moving bushes, thought it was a deer. He fired. The bullet struck his friend in the right side and came out at the left, just below the heart. Death followed instantly. Mrs. Walter Baker, daughter, was summoned by wire to attend the funeral. The deceased was held in great respect when he lived here. He was a veteran of the Grand Army of the Republic and had escaped the bullets of many an enemy, but was finally struck by the missile of a careless hunting companion.—Western Oregon.

## WESTERN WOOLS ENTIRELY SOLD OUT

The New York Daily Trade Record says in a late issue: "About 90 per cent of the 1906 clip of the Western States has now been

cleaned up either by sale or consignment. The last large purchases reported from Montana were made by Boston firms at advances of about 1 per cent over previous ones, and the markets there closed at the opening of the season. Two middle Western buyers practically cleaned up Wyoming at 23 and 24 cents. At different collecting points in the territories clips have been left in the warehouses to be sold at prices that do not attract buyers. "Estimates of unsold stocks up to a few days ago showed that about 2,000,000 pounds of wool remain in growers' hands in Oregon, Washington and Idaho. All the wool could have been sold earlier in the season, but the growers considered the prices offered too low and held for a later market. It is now being disposed of slowly at prices 1 to 2 cents under what was realized at the sealed bid sales."

## STORY OF CRUELTY

TOLD BY MRS. DAHLIN

## Sues John Dahlin for Divorce—Alleges Her Husband Has Been Guilty of Many Brutal Acts During Their Married Life

Mrs. Blanch Dahlin today, through her attorneys, Dorris & Skipworth, instituted suit in the circuit court against her husband, John Dahlin, for divorce. She alleges cruel and inhuman treatment, and if the allegations are true no court in the land would hesitate a moment in granting the decree dissolving the marriage contract.

The marriage occurred at Meadow Lane county, September 30, 1900. Three children were born to them, one aged five years, and Edmund and Theodore, twins, aged nine months. Mrs. Dahlin alleges that on or about October 1, 1902, her husband assaulted her with a whip, at various times called her vile and indecent names and while she was in a delicate condition, just before the twins were born, he kicked her. She also says that when the twins were three months old he whipped one of them, causing a permanent injury. This is only a portion of a long recital of extreme acts of cruelty, as appeared in the plaintiff's complaint.

Mrs. Dahlin asks for the custody of the children, for one-third interest in real property valued at \$1000, for \$75 attorney fee and costs and disbursements of the suit.
