High Finance in Oregon

High finance is not confined to Wall street. In Roseburg, for instance, F. J. Blakeley, president and manager of the light and water systems, was charged in a public meeting of the city council Monday night with not having invested a dollar in the properties he controls. This Mr. Blakeley indignantly denied and declared he had put \$19,000 into the plants which he refused the Willamette Valley Co.'s offer of \$220,000 for, demanding \$230,000. It seems that Messrs. Sherman and Bakely bought the two opposition plants of the city some three years ago, paying the stockholders with stock in the consolidated company, but holding the controlling interest in the same, and issuing some \$200,000 of bonds, which were disposed of to investors, thus acquiring their ownership virtually without the investment of any money of their own.

The point that interests the public in such an expose of corporation methods is the fact that they have to pay, as water and light consumers, the dividends on the watered stock, as well as interest on the bonded indebtedness, the proceeds from the sale of which have gone into the pockets of promoters who have no money of their own invested and are individually responsible for nothing, providing the corporation proves a financial failure. The Willamette Valley Co.'s operations are along similar lines since of the \$220,000 they proposed to pay for the plants \$200,000 was to consist of their assuming the bonded indebtedness and the additional \$20,000 was to be paid Blakeley in the stock of their company. This means that the Willamette Valley Co. was magnanimously willing to succeed Blakeley's company to the ownership of the water and light systems of Roseburg provided they could be acquired without the investment of a dollar of money on their part—they were ready to receive dividends from the companies, forcing the smaller corporation out of the field. Blakeley naturally refused to give up the property on such terms, and the Willamette Valley Co. applied to the city council for a franchise so as to have a club to hold over the head of the smaller corporation and force them to come to terms. Then when the financiers fell out and washed their dirty linen in public the truth became known.

The only moral to be drawn is that the people must stop these franchise gifts to private corporations, for it is upon the special privileges granted that the promoters make and traffic, and in the end become real capitalists from the proceeds of extortionate charges wrong from the very people who presented them with their working capital in the shape of franchises, which they in turn made the basis of stock and bond issues.
