TOTS SCALDED IN A BATHTUB

Babies Turned on Hot Water in Mother's Absence and One Was Fatally Injured.

When Mrs. Emil Orlinsky of New York started out to buy groceries she took her baby, Ida, with her, but left Lena, four years old, at home in charge of her two-year-old brother Benjamin. To prevent any accident Mrs. Orlinsky hid the matches in the kitchen and put the children in the bathroom, where she told them to play until she returned.

Lena thought it would be great fun to put her little brother in the bathtub, which she did, climbing in after him. They played around for awhile. Then an idea struck the little girl. Why not turn on the water, as she had seen her mamma do? She fingered with the faucet and finally succeeded in turning the water on. It was cold at first, and they splashed around in their bare feet, with exclamations of delight. Unfortunately it was the hot water faucet, and the water soon began to grow hotter and hotter. Lena floundered around awhile and succeeded in climbing over the tub to the floor. Her little legs were blistered, and her brother was screaming with pain.

Lena could not turn off the water, so she ran upstairs to Mrs. Klein's flat and knocked on the door. When Mrs. Klein came to the door she cried: "Oh, my legs are all burned up! Just look!"

It was at least two minutes afterward that she explained that her little brother was being burned up too. Benjamin's screams were now heard by Mrs. Klein, and she rushed downstairs to the bathroom, where she found the little fellow's head sticking just above the surface of the scalding water. She snatched him out of the tub and ran screaming into the hallway. By this time the neighbors were aroused, and Patrolman Foster summoned an ambulance from Bellevue hospital, where the child died an hour later.

Just as the ambulance was leaving the mother arrived, and when she heard what had happened she rent her clothes and fell in a faint.

CIGARETTE SET WOMAN ON FIRE

With her hat and hair blazing fiercely, Miss Margaret McLoughlin became the center of an excited crowd on Juniper street, below Chestnut, Philadelphia. A man among the spectators proved stronger and wrenched the hat from its fastenings, after which the friends

The police say that the accident was caused by carelessness in throwing a cigarette out of one of the windows in the Hale building. The fire of the cigarette, fanned by a brisk breeze, easily ignited the flimsy trimming of the hat.
